## From Our Board President

As we begin the new church year (Homecoming Sunday is September 8, 2013), it is

an important time to remind ourselves of the cycle of life. As we enter into a new year of covenant, of shared ministry, of chalice lightings, of introducing ourselves to each other, of holding each other in joy and sorrow, of all these things, may we stop to remind ourselves of why we gather together in community.

Reverend Pam Allen-Thompson began her ministry with us on August 1, 2013 and will be our guide throughout this church year. For those who have not yet met Rev. Pam, please introduce yourself to her the next time you are at the church.

Let us all remember that while we have lost our beloved minister to another congregation, we have not lost the core of this church—the people of this church. It is the people that allow this church to be a force for social justice, at home and abroad; a leader in fighting for anti-racism, anti-oppression and multiculturalism; a safe place for multiple religious and spiritual views and backgrounds; a welcoming congregation; and an active part of the Kalamazoo community for more than 150 years.

As we move forward in our important work, it is imperative that we focus on who we are—here and now—and how we can continue to make UU values a living part of our community. Your Board of Trustees is committed to helping everyone in this church be up-to-date on what we need to do in a time of transition and how we can all work together to maintain our effectiveness in the church, the district, the UUA and abroad. The next key step in our transition process is a retreat on Saturday, October 26, 2013. This

retreat is for the members of the Board of Trustees, the minister, the transition team, and a few other church leaders. The retreat is a gift we receive from the MidAmerica Region (formerly the Heartland District) and will be facilitated by a trained consultant. This retreat is to help church leaders best set the course of action for our first year of interim ministry.

Some time in early 2014, the church will begin a conversation on how to select our ministerial search committee, a committee that will take the lead on searching for our next called minister, someone we will call to begin work with us in September, 2015. There will be numerous conversations around this process and plenty of opportunities for everyone to participate.

As we enter this new year together, let us be open and honest with each other about our hopes as well as our fears. Let us remember to share our concerns with each other and to seek each other's guidance. Please keep in mind that Jill is no longer our minister and not someone we should consult about church business. Part of our healing process is just like the transition from a caterpillar to a butterfly, we must encase ourselves in the process of transition. Unlike the caterpillar, however, we need not do so alone.

As we move through what will feel like uncharted territory for many (any of us who have known only one minister at People's Church), let us do so together, as People's people and let us each remember the beauty that will follow.



## A Letter From The Board Regarding Our New Pet Policy

Recently, concerns have been brought to the Board of Trustees regarding dog visitors at People's Church. These include soiling/damage to carpets, unwanted visits from dogs that are unleashed in the building, as well as other problems. Because of this, the Board has approved the following pet policy for People's Church. This policy might be expanded or revised in the future as needs arise. The policy is addressed to issues of dog visitors only.



- All dogs should be leashed or crated, or confined behind a gate in an area where they can be supervised. No dogs are allowed in the building unless they are under the owner's supervision at all times.
- Dogs that are visiting the building must be house-trained. Owners will be held responsible for any costs incurred due to soiling or other damage to church property. Dogs that are not house-trained should not be brought inside the building.
- Owners should ask permission before allowing their dog to approach other church members or visitors.
- Owners are required to clean up after their dogs on church grounds (i.e. Scoop the Poop!).
- Service dogs, and dogs in training to be service dogs (such as through Paws for the Cause and Leader Dogs) continue to be welcome in the building.

The intent of this pet policy is to keep People's Church a safe and welcoming place for people as well as their dogs. We hope this will address concerns currently being raised by church members.


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## The Study Group

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## Deaf School Project

People's Church member, Rick Johnson, visited Liberia this summer and traveled throughout the country visiting students from his Peace Corps days in the 1960s. Rick is pictured here with Jackson Willie, a Liberian friend who is starting up a much-needed school for deaf Liberian children. He is standing with one of 36 children from his hometown of Buchanan who are totally deaf and do not speak. Jackson has been given classroom space by a local church, but he needs money to employ teachers, feed the students and buy school supplies. Several years ago, while a refugee in Ghana, Jackson taught himself sign language and started a successful school for the deaf kids living at the refugee camp. Now that he's home, he wants to do the same in Liberia. He receives just a little help from grateful parents and the local church. Otherwise, Jackson is alone with this good idea.
