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

I continue to feel delight at all the things I'm learning about People's Church and the many hands and hearts that keep it going. This congregation has good strengths to build upon, and I'm here to help with that.

I will share with you a couple of things that merit our attention. One is an accessibility issue. I have heard from a number of people that they have difficulty hearing any of the Sunday service, even with the ear-phones, and others have noticed that some sections of the room seem to have more dependable sound. I'm sure there are solutions, perhaps even options. Because of our commitment to inclusivity, I hope we will bring the people together who can study the options for improved acoustics and convey their findings to the Board.

Another item that has been disappointing for some is my decision to use a different Order of Service than your previous minister used. This, too, can be addressed. Unlike the Book of Common Prayer and others that have a standard format, a Unitarian Universalist minister often has his or her own approach to constructing the Order of Service. To try to accommodate someone else's style would be inauthentic.

Because authenticity is important to me, as is the health and happiness of our members and friends, I offer this compromise: I will work with the Sunday Services Committee to decide together which elements from the past will be continued, then add the key elements I wish to bring. May we allow ourselves permission to make slight shifts as seem fitting. This experiment with a new Order of Service will run through December, at which time we will assess how well it worked. I welcome conversation about these or other issues anytime.

I particularly appreciate direct conversation. The messages relayed to me anonymously are usually not helpful, and email is not a good tool for expressing concerns or exchanging ideas. Conversation, however, whether by phone or in person, is a much more productive way to find common ground.





The next big event in this process is a start-up retreat that will be held at the church on Saturday, October 26. This retreat is facilitated by someone from the Mid-America region (as a free service to People's) and will be attended by Rev. Pam, the Board of Trustees, the Transition Team, and representatives from almost all of the church committees. We do not yet have an agenda for that retreat, as this will be finalized later in October. However, we will have an informational session for the congregation after the Sunday service on **November 3, 2013**. We will report on the activities of the retreat, answer questions and discuss next steps in the interim process. Our goal throughout this process is to share as much information as possible, hear the concerns of anyone, and help all of us to move the church forward.

In the meanwhile, what will we be called to do as a congregation? Oftentimes, no more than we have done throughout the years: be present, listen to each other, express our beliefs and concerns, be open to opportunity, give ourselves time to get to know each other and how we work together and live out our UU values and principles. In addition, during this unique time in our history, we are also called to participate in the conversation about who we are as a church, who we want to be as a church and how we can reach our goals as a church.

Early in 2014, we will begin our church-wide conversation around forming the Minister Search Committee. To best prepare ourselves for that conversation, let us work with Rev. Pam to understand and practice what needs to happen in order for us to do our best at forming this important committee.

During times of change, it can be hard to let go of what we know. Different can seem bizarre, confusing, odd or uncomfortable. If along the way, you find things odd, confusing, not to your liking – please speak with Rev. Pam or a member of the Board of Trustees. Together, we will successfully navigate this transition and continue to be a positive religious presence in our community.

Getting to Know People's People *By Ardyce Curl*

Following is an interview with a People's person talking about why she came to People's and why she continues to participate.

Kat VanHammen

Kat VanHammen discovered People's about three and a half years ago. "I was looking for a community of people with somewhat like minds with whom to share the spiritual life journey," she said.

Kat grew up in the First Assembly of God Church, which she describes as a Bible based, fundamentalist, evangelical church.

Later she attended a UU church in Columbus, Ohio. She moved to Michigan seven and half years ago when she married Tom who was working at Circle Pines Center near Delton. Kat then became co-director at the Center. In that position she had to work a lot of weekends.

"When I stepped back from that position at Circle Pines Center I had more time available on weekends," Kat said. So then (about four years ago) she decided to check out some UU churches.

"I had heard good things about People's," she said. She has not been disappointed.

Kat said People's Church and Circle Pines Center are much alike in their outlook and values.* (Tom continues to be executive director there.) Kat likes the rituals, the music and the diversity of avenues through which we explore spirituality. At People's she has found kind and engaged people who share her interest in eastern religion, philosophy, the arts and nature.

"I like the mystical path of all religions, but I have learned a lot and cherish Buddhist teachings," she said. "I also love Hindu chanting, yoga in the broadest definition, and anything that connects the body, mind and spirit."

It's important to Kat that a church home offers a balance of comfort yet pushes her to grow and provides support for a spiritual journey, she said. At People's, Kat said she found a great minister and she's sorry Jill is leaving; but she added, "I already like Reverend Pam."

Kat currently is the chair of the Sunday Services committee, created the crystal web ceiling installation in the Commons, has donated to the service auction, and has helped with the Women's Retreat and art wall receptions.

"People's is a very active place," Kat said.

(Kat, 55, is an expressive arts therapist, teacher, artist and gardener. She has taught classes and workshops independently in Kalamazoo, Grand Rapids and Circle Pines, has taught at the Kalamazoo Institute of Arts and is a member of a Playback Theater Company. She is currently teaching healing art classes in a Grand Rapids hospital and hopes to start some expressive-arts-based support groups for women. She is married to Tom VanHammen. Her parents, sister and many other relatives live in Ohio.)

We can also get the coffee in French Press, Espresso and Percolator grinds. So why not enjoy a great cup of coffee and know you are making a difference.

Beloved Conversations: Personal Growth in Issues of Race and Ethnicity

Friends and members of People's Church generally have deeply held values about creating a more just world. We tend to be an exceptionally smart bunch who are dedicated to community action. On our journey toward justice, our smartness often takes us up into our heads—our rationality—as well as out into the world, as a foundational way of moving on our values. While this is both valuable and necessary, it leaves out a very big chunk of important stuff: our individual inner development of knowledge about our own personal racial dynamics and identity. This second set of important 'stuff' *must* be engaged if long-term justice is to be achieved.

In the early summer months of 2013, ARAOMC (Anti-Racism Anti-Oppression Multicultural Committee) sponsored a series of conversations (titled "Beloved Conversations", a UUA-created program) for a group of 18 members and friends of People's. The aim was to round out our social justice/anti-racism identity, individually and as an organization, by providing a safe place to learn, in ever increasing nuanced ways, about such things as how our personal and family racial history influences the lens through which we see and act on racial issues today, about our unrecognized internalized privilege or oppression, about the dynamics of microagressions, about how our church may be unwittingly acting in ways that support institutional racism, and much more. It was a place of mutual support and non-judgment. It was at times a challenging set of conversations, but ultimately a deeply enriching experience. "I didn't realize how much I didn't know" was a common sentiment at the end of the series.

ARAOMC now extends its commitment to personal growth by continuing Beloved Conversations into the 2013-14 church year. A group is now forming, and you are invited to join. The initial organizing meeting will be **Saturday, October 19 at 10:00am** at the church. This group will be focused on using appropriate stimuli to encourage reflection on our inner thoughts, feelings, fears, and past learnings. The group will meet in a modified chalice circle format (much like our summer Sunday services—well, other than the summer of 2013), at a frequency the group members will decide. Once formed, membership will close until the following fall. You need not have attended the original Beloved Conversations in order to join this group.
