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November 10th Special Collection for Disability Network



The special collection on **November 10th** will benefit Disability Network Southwest Michigan, the first stop for people with disabilities and their families in eight counties. They provide Disability Related Information & Referrals; Disability Rights Advocacy; Peer Support Groups; Connections to Community Resources; Independent Living Skills Training; Nursing Facility Transition Services; Assistive Technology Information; Social Security Benefits Counseling; and ADA Compliance Assistance. They also help local agencies become welcoming of people with disabilities by providing them with information, training, technical assistance and support.

Disability Network believes that:

- **The disability experience is best understood by those who experience it**, so more than half of staff and Board members identify as having a disability.
- **Disability is a natural part of the human condition**; not inherently good or bad.
- **A disability exists when someone encounters a barrier**; therefore, the

barrier is the problem, rather than the individual.

- **The language used to describe disability is powerful**; so that disability should be considered as just one characteristic, rather than the identity of the person.



Disability Network, a recognized 'Center for Independent Living' by the Michigan Department of Human Services and U.S. Dept. of Education, Rehabilitation Services Administration, receives revenue from these sources and from service agreements with a variety of agencies, including United Way. Grants and donations from local sources comprise 5% of their budget, with growing competition and need for these dollars. Our special collection will be an important contribution.

Alternative Giving

With the arrival of colder weather, our thoughts turn to the upcoming giving season. This year you can resolve to have a greener, cheaper, more meaningful holiday season through alternative giving. Instead of just going to the mall, be creative by inventing your own original presents, purchasing green products that express your values, or making a donation in someone's name. Here are some suggestions.

- Give your time rather than things. Do someone else's household chores for three months or give babysitting coupons. Those would be inexpensive presents with great meaning and value to the recipient.
- If you're skilled at crafts or like to cook or bake, make your presents. But be sure to start early enough that it doesn't add to the holiday crush.
- Shop at the People's Church Holiday Bazaar where you will find tons of interesting choices, including a white elephant sale where you can find unique and repurposed items.
- Give one of your favorite things or a special book that you have enjoyed to someone that you know will enjoy it also.
- If you love entertaining, give someone a Ground Hog Day party or celebrate the Chinese New Year to take some of the time pressure off the traditional holiday season.
- Donations make wonderful presents for people who really don't need anything. But you need to find a source that has special meaning for that person. Many non-profits have creative donation ideas, as well as the many local organizations to choose from.
- Donations can be great gifts for children too. One grandmother started giving a Heifer International animal to her grandchild when she was two. When she was school age, the grandmother would pick a country and make up a story to go along with the Heifer card.

She would ask the grandchild what animal she would like to give every year. This is one of the favorite traditions that these two still share.

- Paws with a Cause is headquartered nearby in Wayland and you could take a child on an outing so s/he could see how that donation worked. The Elephant Sanctuary in Tennessee rescues old circus and zoo elephants and gives them a home where they can roam free. Just ten dollars makes your child an "EleBacker!"
- There are many, many other paid options like Oxfam, World Wildlife Fund, or Save the Children. Look them up on Alternative Gifts International if you need inspiration.

You will find that giving and receiving alternative gifts is an effective way to channel the true holiday spirit and save your budget and help the environment at the same time.

Pat Pratt's Crispy Grahams

1 box graham crackers ½ cup brown sugar
½ cup walnuts, finely chopped ½ cup butter (1 stick)

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
2. Break graham crackers into rectangles (the smallest shapes that are lined into the crackers.) Place them on a cookie sheet, as close together as you can. You can use a second cookie sheet if you need to.
3. Measure ½ cup brown sugar, firmly packed into a measuring cup. Put it into a small sauce pan along with ½ cup butter.
4. Chop finely ½ cup walnuts. Add to saucepan, too. Heat on medium heat on the stove until butter melts and mixture comes to a boil. With a teaspoon, carefully spread some of the mixture on each of the graham cracker pieces. Be careful—it's hot!
5. When all graham cracker pieces have some of the mixture on them, carefully slide the cookie sheet (or sheets) into the oven. Set a timer to 10 minutes.
6. When the timer goes off, remove the cookie sheet(s) from the oven. Let them cool before handling them.

Library News

Thanks to Emily Cutler, the books in our library are now entered online in the LibraryThing program. This program can be used either at home or at the library via the computer supplied in the area. (It will not handle circulation—that still needs to be done by hand.)

To help us learn how to use LibraryThing and see the changes we have made in combining many of the RE books with the adult ones, we are scheduling two orientation sessions. These will be the first and second Sundays in November. So drop in on Nov. 3rd or 10th at 12:15. It will only take 10-15 minutes.



Now Hear This!

Our new Hearing Loop technology is installed and working in both the Commons and in Room 19. If you have trouble hearing what is said (except when people mumble or don't speak properly into the microphone) the new system may be very helpful—but it requires proper use of a hearing aid with T-Coil. The Western Michigan University Audiology Clinic offers evaluations that are free for WMU employees, retirees, anyone covered by the WMU insurance program. Medicare does not cover hearing evaluations, but most other insurance does cover the evaluation for those not affiliated with WMU. If a hearing aid is recommended, the WMU clinicians can suggest the best kind for you and will recommend that it include a T-Coil that will improve use in many public places including People's Church. The phone number to call for a hearing evaluation is 387-8047.

\$MONEY MATTERS\$

The year is off to a good start financially. Our current pledges are coming in slightly (11%) ahead of budget, and nearly \$4,000 in old pledges has been received. Our expenditures are running below budget so far, resulting in an operating surplus to date of over \$20,000. We have paid down our construction loan balance to \$785,000 thus far and are hoping to reduce it to \$700,000 by the end of the year. 
