FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT, Sue Caulfield

Dear People's People, A lot is going on with the church, and on behalf of the Board of Trustees, I provide some important updates. On October 26, 2013, the church had its start-up retreat, recommended by the UUA to help us understand what it means to be in transition until we call a new settled minister. People's People were represented by the Board, the Transition Team, and twelve other church leaders, for a total of 25

members working with the facilitator and Reverend Pam. In that process, we concluded by covenanting on how we would be together, going forward. I share this covenant so you can know what to expect from your church leaders:

Show up / Trust that people will do what they promise / Trust that we have a common vision / Assume good will / Encourage naming our own limitations, fears & emotions / Listen for content & feelings / Engage with change intentionally, not reactively / When people are seen struggling, respond to the need / Be transparent where transparency is allowed – when not allowed, explain.

Early in December, we will provide you with a timeline of important dates. In January, we will have a retreat with our Ministerial Settlement Representative, who will guide us in the process of choosing our ministerial search committee and completing the necessary tasks to have a successful search for our settled minister.

Meanwhile, the Board will invite your input regarding whether a second capital campaign this spring should be a priority for People's Church. To facilitate that process, we have hired Jeff Susor, the consultant for our *Feeding Our Flame* capital campaign. Jeff will begin working with us to consider next steps. Please watch for an upcoming invitation to share your input.

Mrs. Manley bought two math games: "These resources will help us review and master our basic math facts in the Third Grade. These games will be a cool incentive for the students to practice more."



\$MONEY MATTER\$

As we approach the end of the year, we review where we stand with the Feeding Our Flame (FOF) fund. You can realize 2013 tax deductions for any pledge payments received by December 31. Total FOF pledges were \$724,957 plus \$50,000 in matching funds. Our payments received to date are \$709,121. Estimated payments still to come by June 30 are about \$70,000. Our current loan balance at First National Bank is \$809,475.

We hope to reduce that below \$700,000 by next June 30 with your pledge payments. If you are behind on your FOF pledge, please try to catch up in the next few months. TOUCHSTONES by Cybelle Shattuck

We all have touchstones, personal sources of strength that motivate and sustain us in our efforts to address complex issues like racism and climate change. Originally a term for a hard stone used to identify precious metals in ore, "touchstone" has become a metaphor for the reference points we use to determine what is of value in our lives. These core values, our heart connections to special people and sacred places, give us the courage to take action.



To me, touchstones have an additional quality; they restore me when I am worn down. When I walk in the woods or skip stones across the surface of a lake, when I watch a butterfly dance across a patch of prairie or marvel at the vista from the top of a mountain, my mental and emotional reserves are restored and I find new energy to persevere. This may be one reason I work so hard to protect my touchstones—I cannot live a good life without them.

We would like to include insights about Nature as Touchstone from the cumulative wisdom of People's People. INTERFAITH STRATEGIES for Advocacy and Action in the Community

The dedication of ISAAC members and others over several years has resulted in the Kalamazoo County Commission voting to appropriate \$250,000 to the Local Housing Assistance Fund, with a \$125,000 matching requirement annually, which will help low-income residents secure housing. THIS I BELIEVE

Our Sunday Services have been enhanced by the 3-minute presentations from congregants who are asked to share something of their personal beliefs. Each speaker selects the next one. While not everyone wants to share their beliefs so publicly, those who do have shown the depth and breadth of the wide-ranging beliefs at People's Church. Personally, I think this openness to diversity is one of the core strengths of People's People.

Hannelore Eck, a member since September 1954, has allowed us to share her "This I Believe" moment with you.

THIS I BELIEVE A few days ago I happened to see a car with a bumper sticker that read something like this: "If you could ask God, what question would you ask?" My first-and I fear my only thought was, "Why did you make so many idiots?"

This was a mean-spirited reply. I don't know what and how the owner of the car worships, but clearly, since he needs to share his faith in such a way, surely he deserves some respect. If I take the message on the bumper sticker seriously, I must answer: What do I believe?

I can no longer use the name "God." It has far too many meanings, all of them loaded. More important, all names are limiting, since to limit is the function of a name. So I must say that I believe in a power that is nameless and yet goes by a thousand names; a power that is *invisible*, but is revealed everywhere; that lives in *silence*, but can be heard by all who listen; that is *more* distant than the farthest star, but to me is closer than my skin; that is *timeless* and intimately present.

I know it by the inexpressible joy that fills me when I think of it.

I don't believe that I can ask to have the laws of nature change to accommodate my wants, but I do know from experience that there is a grain of something in me-and in all living things-that, if I reach for it, gives me the strength to live.
