# From the Regathering Team

The People's Church regathering team met on March 23 to review current science and public health recommendations and assess how our

processes and procedures for in-person Sunday morning church attendance has gone so far. It has gone well. People have been great at wearing masks and following our screening procedures. Thank you! Given the high rates of vaccination in our church community and the currently low rates of COVID transmission in Kalamazoo County, we have made some adjustments to our procedures and expectations of one another.

Singing is back! People attending worship in person are now invited to sing during services with their masks on. Rev. Rachel and Savannah Ramsey, our music director, will talk soon about possibilities for choir practices and performances. This will continue as long as Kalamazoo County's CDC COVID Community Level remains low. Health screenings at the doors will continue and we will stop asking people to RSVP for Sunday Services. In our first six weeks of inperson attendance, we have not once reached our inperson attendance cap of 87 people, as many folks continue to prefer to attend services via Zoom or watch them on YouTube. When inperson attendance increases, the regathering team will reassess this. We will continue to screen everyone at the door on Sundays to make sure they are vaccinated, if eligible, and have no symptoms consistent with COVID-19.

Still no coffee hour or other large group eating and drinking together indoors. The regathering team has determined that removing masks to eat (and the socializing that happens while the masks are off) is still too risky. Small groups in the church can continue to decide if they want to

eat and drink together. We know there is a party planned for departing administrator Chris Schleuder on April 24. We hope that the weather will be warm enough for the eating to happen outside. The regathering team plans to meet a few days before that event to assess weather and current COVID conditions to offer guidance for that event.

Masks are no longer required for outdoor activities. The science shows that the risk of COVID-19 while outside is negligible. We will no longer be requiring masks for gatherings and activities on the church grounds. If people prefer to wear masks, they are welcome to do so.

Masks are not required for service leaders who show proof of vaccination and maintain more than six feet of distance from others.

Given the ventilation improvements in The Commons, the regathering team does not believe it is necessary for people who remain seated on the stage/chancel/elevated platform in the front of The Commons to be masked if they are distanced from others. This will mainly apply to Rev. Rachel and Sunday Services Committee members who are leading their portions of the service in-person. Of course, anyone who prefers to mask is welcome to do so.

We know that everyone is assessing the risks of this moment differently and making the choices that are right for them. We will continue to offer multiplatform services for the foreseeable future as well as many programs, groups, and meetings on Zoom. We are committed to following scientific and public health guidance as we navigate this moment. We will give people accurate information about what they can expect at church so they can make informed choices. We strive to be as accessible as we can be to everyone in our People's Church community. If you have questions about any of this, please be in contact with the Regathering Team. ## **Information about Attending Sunday Services in Person**

Beginning on Sunday, February 13, People's Church opened its building to larger in-person attendance at Sunday services. While we allow up to 87 people to attend services in person, our in-person attendance has over the first two Sundays has been about half of that number. Our number of Zoom connections has been about the same as our number of in-person attenders. We are becoming a church that connects on Sundays in multiple ways—and we know some People's people watch services later in the week on YouTube.

#### What can you expect if you attend services in-person?

We ask people who attend services in person to RSVP at <a href="https://rsvp.church/r/8chPdBqa">https://rsvp.church/r/8chPdBqa</a>. If you are planning to come, but develop symptoms consistent with COVID-19, please stay home and participate in the service via Zoom. When you enter the church building, you will be greeted by health screeners, who will remind you that we expect people to be masked for their whole time in the church building, be as vaccinated as it is possible to be, have no symptoms consistent with COVID-19, and tell the church if you develop COVID-19 within three days after attending. (If you would like to volunteer as a health screener, please reach out to Marti Peters-Sparling at <a href="mailto:martipeters@yahoo.com">martipeters@yahoo.com</a>.)

People attending the service in The Commons will then check in to the service at a table in the Foyer. We want to keep track of who is present so we can notify people if we later learn of a COVID-19

So far, this process has gone well, with people remaining well-masked for the duration of their time in the building and no known COVID exposures. Thank you to everyone for your care for this community, your flexibility, and patience as we find new ways to be together.

The Article II Study Commission welcomes input from all Unitarian Universalists to inform the reimagining of Article 2 of the UUA Bylaws. The Study Commission has identified four areas of inquiry: Shared Values, Inspirations, Purpose, and Covenant. The Article II Individual Survey (linked) will remain open until April 30,

#### **Green Spot—Kalamazoo County Climate Action**

The Michigan Climate Action Network (MICAN) just released a new report highlighting sixteen state governments that have adopted climate action goals and plans to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Kalamazoo Charter Township got a mention; our own Nicky Leigh is heavily involved in this critically needed initiative.



To facilitate more such urgent action at the local level, the Kalamazoo Climate

<u>Crisis Coalition</u> (People's is among over forty affiliates) began a countywide campaign to engage citizens in collective action, the central aim of which is to support and fund the creation of a Climate Coordinator. The job of this individual would be to assist local governments in formulating aggressive action plans on climate.

You might remember that all three local municipalities - The City of Kalamazoo, Kalamazoo Charter Township and Kalamazoo County – passed climate emergency declarations in 2019. And recently Oshtemo Charter Township's also passed a formal emergency resolution.

If you live in any of the 24 governmental units in Kalamazoo County, we invite you to considering joining our team by completing this form. We need to mobilize our voices to be heard.

# Household Items Needed for Refugees

The Interfaith Afghan Resettlement Team is currently helping eight refugee families start a new life here in Kalamazoo. We are requesting donations of toilet paper, paper towels, dish soap, liquid



hand soap, laundry detergent – preferably Tide Free and Gentle, shampoo and conditioner, and body lotion. These items cannot be purchased with their Bridge cards which only cover food and they tend to be expensive. The donated items can be brought to church and left on the table at the top of the stairs overlooking the lower entry level.

Chalice Circles are small groups that meet a few hours each month (typically on Zoom) with a format designed to provide opportunities for honest sharing and deep listening.

As the leading disability social services organization in Southwest Michigan, our goal is to help foster a community where people with disabilities are able to participate fully in everyday life with equal opportunities and self-determination. We also assist organizations, businesses, and government agencies to understand their rights and responsibilities under the



Americans with Disabilities Act. We provide workshops and onsite training, technical assistance and support in

learning to be welcoming of people with disabilities as customers, clients, patrons, volunteers, or employees. Our goal as a disability rights advocate is to protect the civil and human rights of individuals with disabilities, and make sure that the laws put in place to protect them are vigorously enforced.

We were founded in 1981 by a small group of disability rights activists. Our name at that time was The Kalamazoo County Center for Independent Living. We later dropped the word "County" and were widely known as KCIL. In 2010, to be consistent with a statewide name change, we re-branded ourselves with the name Disability Network Southwest Michigan.

## **Stewardship Progress**



The petitions must be received by the church administrator at least four weeks prior to the Annual Meeting (the date is April 17). Petitions are available from the church administrator.

#### Gordon Bolar—Board of Trustees





### People's Church White Elephant Sale—Saturday, May 14

Have you heard the rumor about a White Elephant sale being planned for Spring? It's not a rumor! The People's Bazaar team met during early winter and decided the pandemic restrictions have eased enough that we can safely offer this to our community, especially given the success of last fall's Fine Arts & Bazaar outdoor event. We're looking forward to resuming this tradition, albeit differently than in years past.



Before sharing a few details from our early planning sessions, we feel it's important to account for the furniture, kitchen and household items that church members and the community at large donated to the Afghan resettlement program during September, 2021. Due to overwhelming generosity, our Commons was filled to capacity for several months. The majority of those donations have been dispersed to several newly resettled families. Most donations received in excess of what was needed were transported to Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Portage so that asylee support teams could have a central location to aid in setting up new households. A few pieces of furniture not able to be used by newly arriving families due to size or configuration were sold on Facebook Marketplace,

and the proceeds were deposited into People's Afghan resettlement fund. We did set aside some donated items in Rooms 6/7 that were not able to be used by incoming families either because they were the wrong size (such as bed linens) or culturally inappropriate. Those items will be incorporated into the White Elephant sale. The Afghan resettlement and White Elephant teams, in consultation with Rev. Rachel, have decided the proceeds from the Spring sale will be split 50/50 between the church and the Afghan asylee fund.

So mark your calendar for a joyful, outdoor shopping event on **Saturday, May 14** (rain date May 21). We'll be announcing dates and times for dropping off donations soon. In the meantime, please start setting aside new or gently loved items such as books, toys, games, household decor, kitchenware, etc.

#### **Earth Day Celebrations**

Brainstorming ideas for our Earth Day Intergenerational worship service has me excited about all the possibilities. Back by popular demand! Hearing stories and messages each week that center the value of healthy and intact ecosystems for their own sake regardless of how they serve humanity are imperative to counteract and dismantle the dominant paradigm.

Participating in hands-on nature activities helps to nurture a relationship with the natural world. When combined with ideas around respect and reciprocity, it forms a foundational understanding of humanity's true role.

Would you like a taste of these experiences? We will have opportunities as part of the interactive stations at our Earth Day service. We are fortunate that several of the kids who have been engaged in these RE lessons this year have agreed to lead folks on short walks on the trails around the church grounds during our Earth Day Service on 4/24.

I'm excited to gather together inside the commons as an intergenerational community for the first time in over two years to worship together and celebrate Earth Day. Halfway through the service, participants will be invited to head outdoors to participate in a variety of activity stations designed to foster deeper connections, learning, exploration and artistic expression.

I hope to see folks of all ages back at People's Church to enjoy in person connections, inspiration and celebration! Plus I'll need some kids present to help me tell the story.


# Facing Life, Facing Death Tuesday, April 26 1:30-3:00pm, on Zoom
