June 12 A Celebration of Community & Generosity: A Flower Service

We end the program year with our flower service. Everyone attending the service (in-person and on Zoom) should bring a flower with them to exchange. This Sunday, we will also be celebrating the successful payoff of People's Church's building debt, celebrating our generous capital donors, opening the time capsule from when this building on Tenth Street was first constructed, and having our first People's potluck since 2020 outside on the church grounds following the service (weather permitting).



There will also be a walk- bike- and drive-thru flower ritual for those who are not comfortable attending church indoors on Saturday June 11 from 10am to noon. This will be a chance to exchange flowers and the first chance to see the contents of the time capsule from 1969.

Each year, Kalamazoo Pride brings together over 8,000 people of all ages, genders, sexual orientations, and racial identities from Southwest Michigan and beyond to celebrate LGBTQ+ Pride. From the Minister



Dear People's people,

Thank you to all of you who participated in our recent Congregational Conversation: Listening Across Generations. About 70 People's Church adults – spanning about 70 years in age – participated in-person and on Zoom.

Reports are that all the conversations were rich. I am still thinking about some of the stories that were shared in the circles I sat with. Thank you to all who gave your time, your attention, your excellent questions, and your honesty to these conversations.

The team I am working with on this conversation process – Tom Hackley, Karen Friedel, and Donna McClurkan – and I have set the dates and structure for our next congregational conversations. Mark your calendars for Sunday July 10 at 12:30 for the in-person conversation and Monday July 11 at 7pm for the conversation on Zoom. These conversations will have a similar fishbowl-style structure as our last conversations, in which groups that share a characteristic talk amongst themselves while another group listens and then the group switch roles. Instead of dividing by age, however, we will divide by length of time as part of the People's Church community. Church leaders and I have noticed that there are differences in experience, opinions about the church, and hopes for its future that are tied to how long someone has been part of this church community. (Of course, just like with age, there are differences between groups as well.) As your minister, I've had some fascinating conversations about this with individuals and small groups, ranging from new member orientations to some of our members who joined when Mr. Palmer was the minister. (He died in 1956.) I have learned from each conversation and my

understanding of People's Church and its people has broadened. I am hoping that this congregational conversation will give more people that same opportunity to listen, learn, speak, and understand.

Information about Attending Sunday Services in Person

People's Church is now offering in-person attendance at Sunday services. We are becoming a church that connects on Sundays in multiple ways—and we know some People's people watch services later in the week on YouTube.

What can you expect if you attend services in-person?

If you are planning to come, but develop symptoms consistent with COVID-19, please stay home and participate in the service via Zoom. When you enter the church building, you will be greeted by health screeners, who will remind you that we expect people to be masked for their whole time in the church building, be as vaccinated as it is possible to be, have no symptoms consistent with COVID-19, and tell the church if you develop COVID-19 within three days after attending. So far, this process has gone well, with people remaining well-masked for the duration of their time in the building and no known COVID exposures. Thank you to everyone for your care for this community, your flexibility, and patience as we find new ways to be together.

ISAAC Update

Please Save this Special Date! The ISAAC annual meeting will take place virtually on Zoom on Tuesday evening July 12th, from 7 - 9pm. We will be celebrating ISAAC'S accomplishments from 2021.



Work in progress continues this month organizing for voter engagement and registration prior to the August 2 primary and collecting signatures in support of legislation to protect voting access and voter rights.

Gatherings were held to support Gun Violence Prevention and the work of GVI - Gun Violence Intervention Program (see Bridge Magazine feature about GVI at <https://bridgemi.us19.list-manage.com/track/click?u=dc0580ddb0e80e7779bcf533a&id=7e566e51d6&e=bdc011055b>)

Anti-Racism efforts have focused on assuring equity in the process of candidates filing to run for county commission and working with the Kalamazoo Defender for transparency and accountability in our criminal justice processes. As Dr. Charlae reminded us, beloved community work is not always easy. It is not always hugs and smiles. It has conflict but not violence. We will advocate for TRUE equity, in honest and caring ways.

The Interfaith Afghan Resettlement Team is currently helping eight refugee families start a new life here in Kalamazoo.

We are now asking for twin sheet sets to serve as 2nd/backup sets for the total of 36 twin beds currently being used. The donated items can be brought to church and left on the table at the top of the stairs overlooking the lower entry level. Exciting news from the AlTayara family. In addition to Adham passing his citizenship written test and participating in the official citizenship ceremony in Grand Rapids in May, his mother, Fate-ma passed her test too!

When she officially becomes a citizen the twins, Abdullah and Omar will automatically become citizens too! Molham and Moyadd are going to be taking their



tests in the near future. Almost six years ago the family arrive in the US as refugees of the Syrian War, not speaking any English. Our People's Church Resettlement Team worked together to give this family a good start to their new life in America and it has really paid off! They have beautiful new home, they are all (except Khaled who has not yet learned English) on their way to becoming US citizens. Moayyad and Adham are both honor roll students at WMU making great progress towards earning their bachelor degrees. Abdullah and Omar are doing well in 10th grade at Kalamazoo Central. There is much to celebrate!

Center for Transformation

Advocates for the incarcerated have started a ballot drive to allow Michigan inmates to earn

time off their sentences. The [Good Time initiative](#) would give prisoners credit for participating in a training program or earning a college degree. Inmates would also be able to reduce their sentences by taking anger management and



drug treatment courses.

A Good Time representative gave a tutorial to the parolees attending Tuesday meetings on how to collect signatures for the petition drive to put the Good Time Initiative on the ballot.

Green Spot—People's to Host Bike & Build July 3-4



The Green Sanctuary Committee will be hosting about 25 members of a Bike & Build crew Sunday afternoon, July 3, to Monday morning, July 4. They “engage young adults in service-oriented, cross-country cycling

trips to raise money and awareness for affordable housing.”

This summer, 100 riders will participate in three cross-country trips and one regional trip between June 12 and August 26. Our group, the Northern US team, will leave the Atlantic coast at Portsmouth, NH, and travel to the Pacific coast at Bellingham, WA. Enroute they will participate in build days with more than 14 different affordable housing organizations.

They will arrive in Kalamazoo from Grand Rapids via the Kalamazoo River Valley Trail, and their next stop will be in South Bend, IN. They won't be building in Kalamazoo, just staying over on their way to their next build site.

The majority of the group will arrive mid-afternoon on July 3, with a small advance party arriving that morning. They'll get themselves set up and then we'll provide dinner. That evening, there

will be a program, probably including an introduction to their activities and a bicycle repair and maintenance clinic. This will be open to church members and probably to the general public. They'll sleep on the floor overnight, with a couple of our members staying with them to help out if needed.



Bike & Build

We're excited about how this activity ties together two of our church's social justice concerns—encouraging bicycle use to cut carbon emissions and helping provide affordable housing. We're also looking at ways to include at least one more area. Details are still developing! Watch the “This Week at People's Church” email for updates.

June Special Collection: Kalamazoo Drop-In Child Care Center : June 12

The June Special Collection will be held on Sunday June 12th to benefit the Kalamazoo Drop-In Child Care Center (KDCCC).

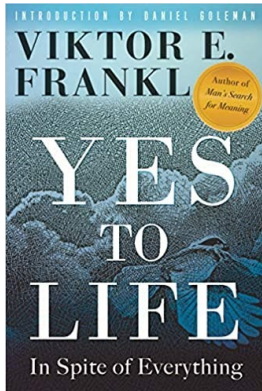
The Kalamazoo Drop-In Child Center established in 1990, provides free, part-time child care for income eligible families with children ages six weeks through five years old. The objective of KDCCC is to enable parents with young children to more rapidly negotiate the maze of appointments and services often required to obtain employment, permanent housing, register for school or attend classes, and attain eventual self-sufficiency. We also give parents a “healthy” break from the demands of parenting. Our Center is a warm, safe, and supportive environment for children and their families. KDCCC is the only child care center in Southwest Michigan that provides free, part-time child care.

Say Yes to Life; in Spite of Everything, by Viktor E. Frankl



Eleven months after he was liberated from the Nazi concentration camps, Viktor E. Frankl held a series of public lectures in Vienna. The psychiatrist, who would soon become world famous, explained his central thoughts on meaning, resilience, and the importance of embracing life even in the face of great adversity.

Frankl's words resonate as strongly today—as the world faces a coronavirus pandemic, social isolation, and great economic uncertainty—as they did in 1946. He offers an insightful exploration of the maxim “Live as if you were living for the second time,” and he unfolds his basic conviction that every crisis contains opportunity. Despite the unspeakable horrors of the camps, Frankl learned from the strength of his fellow inmates that it is always possible to “say yes to life”—a profound and timeless lesson for us all.

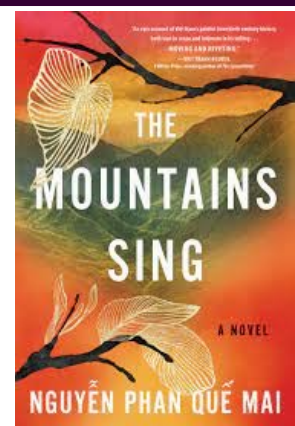
How to Check Out/Return a Book from People's Church Library

1. Open the front cover of the book.
2. Note the card in the pocket. Remove the card. Occasionally the card and pocket are inside the back cover of the book.
3. Print the full day's date in the left column of the card.
4. Print your name in the right column.
5. Add your email address and phone number. Use another line if necessary.
6. Locate the open wooden box which is on the window side of the far right bookshelf near the double doors to the Commons. A wire basket is above this shelf.
7. Place the book card in front of the right portion of the box.
8. To return the book, place it in the wire basket above the wooden box. Library committee members will replace the card and re-shelve the book.

Black Lives Matter Meal Train

What does the work of antiracism look like in our congregation? How are we working to dismantle white supremacy culture in our community?

In an effort to build a relationship with and be an ally to the Kalamazoo/Battle Creek Black Lives Matter organization, I have asked how we can best serve their needs. They replied with two main requests. One is to have People's Church act as a can and bottle repository for their fundraising efforts. Two is to support their meal train for a local family who has hit difficult times.

This is three generations of folks sharing a modest household in Kalamazoo. The matriarch of the family is unable to chew due to severe TMJ so appreciates soups, smoothies and other liquid meals. The rest of the family of five has no other food allergies or preferences. They are requesting meals twice weekly.



I have brought them meals and am hopeful there are folks in our community who are willing and able to support them in this way as well.

In partnering with people of color, white people have often decided what was most needed and then implemented their own ideas and plans to "help." Following the lead of local organizations and responding to their requests feels like an important way to decenter whiteness and be allies.

We can live out our espoused values in the world as we offer our service and support where it is most requested to ease the burdens on folks of color in our community.

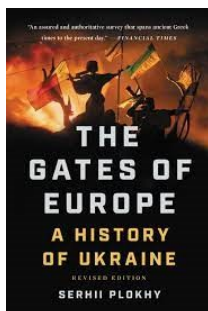

Meal Train: Help support one of our families during a very challenging time.

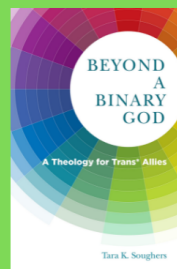
