Building and Grounds and Green Sanctuary Sponsored Work Day

On Saturday, October 1, from 9-12:30, our two committees are organizing a church-wide work day to take care of some larger tasks and to spruce up our building and grounds for the fall.

Tasks will include: thinning out hostas and ferns that are crowding the building along the north side;



weeding and winterizing the terraces; applying new tar to parts of the roof that are aging; repairing a section of flashing along the eave of the roof of the commons; spray washing and re-caulking the bay windows on the north and south side classrooms and offices. Each task will be supervised by someone who has the knowhow, so even if you are unsure of your skills you can still contribute constructively.

Information about Attending Sunday Services in Person

People's Church is now offering in-person attendance at Sunday services. We are becoming a church that connects on Sundays in multiple ways—and we know some People's people watch services later in the week on YouTube.

What can you expect if you attend services in-person?

If you are planning to come, but develop symptoms consistent with COVID-19, please stay home and participate in the service via Zoom. When you enter the church building, you will be greeted by health screeners, who will remind you that we expect people to be masked for their whole time in the



church building, be as vaccinated as it is possible to be, have no symptoms consistent with COVID-19, and tell the church if you develop COVID-19 within three days after attending. So far, this process has gone well, with people remaining well-masked for the duration of their time in the building and no known COVID exposures. Thank you to everyone for your care for this community, your flexibility, and patience as we find new ways to be together.

Green Spot—Individual Actions for Climate Change



All of us know Reduce, Reuse, Recycle. It's the mantra for an individual's responsibility in lowering personal carbon emissions and living more sustainably. But how do we do more? Should we do more?

Yes, it is vital to do more. Individuals cannot lower or reverse the emissions of greenhouse gasses (GHG) by their own actions. Methane (80x) and nitrogen oxide (300x)



are many times more potent than carbon dioxide but how often do we hear about them? And what can we, as individuals, do to reduce them? Even water vapor is a GHG.

It is time (past time!) for County, State and Federal mandates. We can change building codes, build mass transit for everyone, create and enforce laws around manufacturing to lower pollution, subsidize renewables instead of fossil fuels, etc. But we as individuals can only do this if we vote for the future.

We citizens can support Climate organizations. Yes, this requires research on our parts to find

places we fit, but for the future, we need to get involved.

Kalamazoo Climate Crisis Coalition

Locally, People's is a member of the Kalamazoo

Climate Crisis Coalition (KCCC). It should be starting Fridays for the Future programs shortly after the school year begins. These are educational sessions about climate change actions being taken.

Statewide, in Michigan you can join MICAN, Michigan Climate Action Network, a network of concerned organizations working at the State level to implement change.

Federally, an example of a national organization with a local chapter is Citizens Climate Lobby. This organization would like to implement a national carbon fee on corporations' carbon emissions and that fee would then be distributed to households to offset any added costs to consumers. Internationally, a gradually increasing carbon fee has been proven to be an effective incentive for companies to cut carbon emissions.

So, yes, continue to Reduce, Reuse, Recycle but also start bugging your elected officials. Your

vote counts and it's the most effective tool we have to get elected officials to listen. This is an election year. Become a Climate





How to Search the People's Church Library Catalog from Home

The instructions below are listed in People's Church website (peopleschurch.net). Find Engage with Us in the blue strip above the large photo of the church. Choose Church Library Catalog from the drop down menu.

- Go to <u>www.librarything.com/catalog/peopleschurchofkzoo</u>
- Decide which collection you'd like to search (Main Church Library=adult titles; RE Library=children's titles) and select it from the list in the upper left.
- Near the upper right in the box next to the yellow word 'Search', enter a title or author or simple desired topic.
- Use the book's Dewey call number in the left hand column to locate the book in People's library. People's Library collection is located in the upper foyer to the left of the door into the Commons. The books are divided into Main Church Library (adult) and RE Library (children's).
- The Main Church Library begins to the left of the middle of the back wall and continues (left to right, in ascending Dewey call numbers) across the aisle to the right end of the low bookshelves and then around to the front of the bookcase, ending with B (biographies). The RE Library begins in the middle of the front side of the low bookshelves, ending with RE picture books and fiction (J).

Car Needed for Resettled Family

Our first Afghan family - Fariba Hussaini and her three children Hania 15, Mahdis 10, and Mohammad Saleh 7, who arrived in mid-November, will soon be in need of a car. Fariba has been working very hard to learn English and has made great progress. She has passed her

written driver's permit test (learning the rules and laws of driving in the U.S. and taking the test in her native



language). She is in the process of learning to drive. As a single mother, she is a very strong woman, and remarkably committed to making a new life in the U.S. and providing for her family. A very tall order! We all know how dependent we are on having reliable transportation to get to our jobs, shop for food and other necessities, manage to get to school conferences and pick up sick kids and a myriad of other places to go to.

Having a car is the key to independence! The Interfaith Afghan Resettlement Team is looking for a suitable vehicle for the family. That would be a 5 passenger small car that gets good mileage. If you have a reliable car that you might be willing to donate or sell to her (we'll need to loan her the money, as she has not been working yet) please contact Ann Feldmeier at 269-720-1649.

Please also consider passing the word to your family and friendship groups that we are looking for a car for her. When People's Church resettled the AlTayara family, refugees from the Syrian War, a member of our church came forward to provide a van that they were no longer driving. We are hoping someone will come forward with a similar offer - it does not have to be a gift, but it does need to be under \$5,000, hopefully less expensive.

Meal Train: Help support one of our families during a very challenging time.

Like so many others, Zoe and her family are struggling to keep up with life in general. In addition to parenting



young children, Zoe is going through long-term treatment of a large tumor in her right shoulder and back.

It causes a great deal of pain and makes it difficult to take care of everyday tasks, and the medications have side effects that include fatigue, brain fog, and arthritis-like pain in her hands and feet. Knowing that they have one night a week where they don't have to think about and prepare dinner would be a great help.


