Information about Attending Sunday Services in Person

People's Church is now offering in-person attendance at Sunday services. We are becoming a church

that connects on Sundays in multiple ways—and we know some People's people watch services later in the week on YouTube.

What can you expect if you attend services in-person?

If you are planning to come, but develop symptoms consistent with COVID-19, please stay home and participate in the service via Zoom. When you enter the church building, you will be greet-



ed by health screeners, who will remind you that we expect people to be masked for their whole time in the church building, be as vaccinated as it is possible to be, have no symptoms consistent with COVID-19, and tell the church if you develop COVID-19 within three days after attending. (If you would like to volunteer as a health screener/greeter (NO MEDICAL EXPERIENCE NEEDED!), please reach out to Marti Peters-Sparling at martijpeters@yahoo.com.)

So far, this process has gone well, with people remaining well-masked for the duration of their time in the building and no known COVID exposures. Thank you to everyone for your care for this community, your flexibility, and patience as we find new ways to be together.

canvassing; outreach to inactive voters from these neighborhoods, and grassroots community forum with judicial candidates.

Preventing Gun Violence

Collaborating with community allies, ISAAC

conducted events to heighten public awareness



about local impacts of gun violence and increase advocacy for policies and interventions to prevent it, such as the Wear Orange Rally and Gun Violence Resource & Resilience Rallies.

Preventing Youth Violence



Summer Youth Programs were hosted by ISAAC for innovative neighborhood-based programs including Blocks Club Youth Ambassadors, GVI Youth

Academy and Parents United Youth Entrepreneurs, to develop leadership and

engagement of BIPOC youth.

Anti-Racism and Affordable Housing

ISAAC members contributed public comments to public



officials in Portage, Kalamazoo, surrounding townships, and County government on matters



involving equity and access in housing decisions, human resource matters, and race-related

incidents. Candidates for public office made commitments to antiracism training as part of the ISAAC Public Meeting.

Special Collection: Community Homeworks Maternal Wellness and Small Child Pilot Program January 8, during the service

Community Homeworks provides critical home repairs and education to low income homeowners that allow them to be safe and warm, avoid homelessness, and build generational wealth.

In partnership with Cradle Kalamazoo (a previous special

offering recipient), Community Homeworks is beginning a program to provide critical home repairs (like furnace and water heater repairs and replacements) to households that include pregnant people and babies. Green Spot — Composting — Back to the Earth



Composting—Back to the Earth

We're sharing some meals at church again, so we're also producing food waste. Did you know that you can compost

much of that food waste and return it to the soil? Thanks to the volunteer work of Bob Friedel and Kimberly Ginn, we have a system for that at People's.

Composting keeps organic matter out of the landfill, where it would rot and produce greenhouse gases. Instead, organic materialsturned-compost enrich the soil and provide



nutrients to plants. Mineral-rich compost in the garden also means that use of chemical fertilizers on plants can be avoided.

Instructions are

posted in the kitchen, so you'll know what you can compost and how to do it. Briefly, when you're done preparing and eating your meal or snack, collect any fruit or vegetable scraps. Napkins, coffee grounds and tea bags are also compostable. We still have to put animal products, oils, processed foods and trash in the garbage/landfill.

Add your compostable materials to the bin on the kitchen counter, or place them in the larger bin outside near the back entrance. That's it! Bob will make sure it's stirred and the microorganisms will do the rest. Compost happens! When it's broken down, Kimberly and our other gardeners will use the finished compost for the plants in our gardens.

If you still have questions after you've looked at the posted instructions, please check with Kimberly. This is all part of making People's a Green Sanctuary. Thanks for helping.

How to Search the People's Church Library Catalog from Home

The instructions below are listed in People's Church website (peopleschurch.net). Find Engage with Us in the blue strip above the large photo of the church. Choose Church Library Catalog from the drop down menu.

Go to <u>www.librarything.com/catalog/</u> <u>peopleschurchofkzoo</u>

Decide which collection you'd like to search (Examples: Main Church Library=adult titles; RE Library=children's titles) and select it from the list in the upper left.

Near the upper right in the box next to the

yellow word 'Search', enter a title or author or simple desired topic.

Use the book's Dewey call number in the left hand column to locate the book in People's library. People's Library collection is located in



the upper foyer to the left of the door into the Commons. The books are divided into Main Church Library (adult) and RE Library (children's).

The Main Church Library begins to the left of the middle of the back wall and continues (left to right, in ascending Dewey call numbers) across the aisle to the right end of the low bookshelves and then around to the front of the bookcase, ending with B (biographies). The RE Library begins in the middle of the front side of the low bookshelves, ending with RE picture books and fiction (J).



otypes, I aspire to work through and release as many layers as I can.


This important healing work will hopefully allow me to return to serve this congregation after my sabbatical feeling refreshed and able to set healthy boundaries




Thanks to all of you who have made donations to assist our Refugee friends. There continue to be needs as there are new arrivals & cold weather is here. These are items we're needing:

Study Group




