
February 5: How Much Brutality Can We Bear?: On Interdependence and Capitalism **Rev. Rachel Lonberg**

What level of brutality and exploitation will we accept as a society in order to get the things we want but do not need?' asked journalist Ramtim Arablouei on a recent episode of NPR's Throughline podcast. Rev. Rachel has not been able to stop thinking about this question. It so clearly describes the challenges of living in our interconnected, capitalist world, where our consumer choices impact distant people in ways that we might never fully know. What does it mean to live ethically in this reality?

From the Minister



Dear People's People,

Every February, the Unitarian Universalist Association asks all congregations to submit information as part of an annual certification process. I wanted to share some of the more interesting pieces of our recent report:

People's Church has 254 members! Members

are people who have signed the Bond of Union and participated in the life of the congregation in the past 18 months (by giving, attending Sunday services, or participating in our church life in other ways). This is a slight decrease from our last detailed membership count in early 2020, when we had 256 members. It felt too impossible to track membership in 2021 & 2022, when we were gathering primarily on Zoom.

People's Church has 152 friends! Because of some great work by People's Church staff on our database, we have our first accurate count of 'friends' in many years. Friends is our word for adults who participate in the life of our church who are not members. These friends range from deeply committed folks who have not signed the Bond of Union, to people who are newer visitors.

We also send the UUA some updates on our church finances. Over the last year, our building rental income has gone up, our number of pledgers has gone down, and our contributions to the UUA have increased. The most exciting part of our financial reporting is that **we have no long-term debt!** This is the first time we could report this since People's people expanded our church building over a decade ago.

The past few years have brought so many unforeseen challenges to our lives and to the life of People's Church. Thank you to everyone for all of your efforts to weave our church community together. We are holding together, welcoming new people, and moving in the direction of our vision.

The People's Church regathering team met on January 24, 2023 to review current science and public health recommendations and review our current COVID related procedures. Given the high rates of vaccination in our church community and the currently low rates of COVID transmission in Kalamazoo County, we have made some adjustments to our procedures and expectations of one another.



Beginning in February, MASKS WILL NO LONGER BE

REQUIRED at People's Church – including on Sunday mornings during service and Religious Education classes. Anyone is, of course, still welcome to bring and wear a mask based on their own needs and preferences. We will also no longer be using the COVID screening/sign in forms at the welcome table on Sunday mornings.

We know that everyone is assessing the risks of this moment differently and making the choices that are right for them. We will continue to offer multi-platform services for the foreseeable future as well as many programs, groups, and meetings on Zoom. We are committed to following scientific and public health guidance as we navigate this moment and will give people accurate information about what they can expect at church so they can make informed choices. We strive to be as accessible as we can be to everyone in our People's Church community.

Remember to review **ALL** of the great ideas posted on the board and add





about local impacts of gun violence and increase advocacy for policies and interventions to prevent it, such as the Wear Orange Rally and Gun Violence Resource & Resilience Rallies.

Preventing Youth Violence



Summer Youth Programs were hosted by ISAAC for innovative neighborhoodbased programs including Blocks Club Youth Ambassadors, GVI Youth

Academy and Parents United Youth Entrepreneurs, to develop leadership and engagement of BIPOC youth.

Anti-Racism and Affordable Housing ISAAC members contributed public comments to public



officials in Portage, Kalamazoo, surrounding townships, and County government on matters



involving equity and access in housing decisions, human resource matters, and race-related

incidents. Candidates for public office made commitments to antiracism training as part of the ISAAC Public Meeting.

<u>February Special Collection: Legacy</u> <u>House</u> <u>Sunday February 5th</u>

The Legacy House is a program of OutFront Kalamazoo. Legacy House offers transitional housing



"Images of the Night", photography by Eric Schreur

Exhibit Dates: February 25 to March 25, 2023 Artist Reception: Sunday, February 12, 2023 12:15-1:15 after the service Hours: By appointment or during church hours.

Eric has been interested in astronomy and photography since his high school years and was always fascinated by the night sky. His early photographs of the sky were made with a traditional film camera, processed in a darkroom.





With the advent of digital photography and his expertise in Photoshop, Eric can capture and produce images with more precision than ever before.

This exhibit includes a variety of exquisite photographs of the night sky, including many of the Milky Way. There is also a composite image showing the stages of a total solar eclipse.

He has traveled around the world to witness a dozen total solar eclipses. He carries the same camera and lens combination to each eclipse, and now uses a tripod and tracking motor to follow the sun, and a small computer to trigger the camera.


Bachelor of Science and Master of Science Education degrees from Western Michigan University led him to his former position as Planetarium Coordinator at the Kalamazoo Valley Museum from 1985-2015. His avid interest remains in his retirement as he built a small backyard observatory to continue photographing the night sky.

All along they have prioritized BIPOC organizers and families, safety, dignity, and care.

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Green Spot — What's Happening with all the Funding Packages from the **Federal Government?**

Over the past year, Congress has approved, and the President has signed 2 huge spending bills: The Bipartisan Infrastructure Legislation, and the Inflation Reduction Act. Both of these had large portions devoted to climate mitigation and adaptation. The administration is working feverishly to prepare Federal agencies to roll out the funds, and expects to have portions ready by late 2023. Many of the rebates are available now for individuals

So how will this affect me?

Individuals are eligible for a mixture of: 1) upfront discounts, right when you buy electric appliances; 2) tax credits you can claim later; 3) and low-cost financing. Your income determines the particular makeup of these benefits.



What's covered?

For your home: heat pumps, heat pump water heaters, upgrades to your wiring, weatherization, electric stove upgrades, efficiency improvements, geothermal heating, rooftop solar, battery

storage, weatherization.

Electric Vehicles: new and used electric vehicles, EV charger





The RE Library begins in the middle of the front side of the low bookshelves, ending with RE picture books and fiction (J).




