Information about Attending Sunday Services in Person

People's Church is now offering in-person attendance at Sunday services. We are becoming a church that connects on Sundays in multiple ways—and we know some People's people watch services later in the week on YouTube.

What can you expect if you attend services inperson?

If you are planning to come, but develop symptoms consistent with COVID-19, please stay home and participate in the service via Zoom. When you enter the church building, you will be greeted by health screeners, who will remind



you that we expect people to be masked for their whole time in the church building, be as vaccinated as it is possible to be, have no symptoms consistent with COVID-19, and tell the church if you develop COVID-19 within three days after attending. So far, this process has gone well, with people remaining well-masked for the duration of their time in the building and no known COVID exposures. Thank you to everyone for your care for this community, your flexibility, and patience as we find new ways to be together.

ISAAC Update

The 20th Anniversary of ISAAC (Interfaith Strategy for Advocacy and Action in the Community) was celebrated at the virtual Public Meeting last week. Since its inception in 2002, Peoples' Church and our people have been actively engaged with many other congregations and partners in organizing for policy reforms that make Kalamazoo County a more just and equitable community. It is a legacy that we can be proud of assisting in working toward building the Beloved Community.

This year, asks were made of elected leaders, candidates for public office, public officials, our clergy, and congregations to support actions to prevent gun violence, to create more equitable and antiracist practices in governance processes, to vote in the upcoming election and support Proposal 2 for greater voter access, and continue



policy actions that prioritize affordable access to housing.

Many members and friends of our congregation attended the meeting from their homes and a group gathered at church for the ISAAC Watch Party. Rev. Rachel made us proud with her words of wisdom shared for all.

I am proud of being a UU since February of 1962 at UU Church West in Brookfield, WI. After living in



done)



Library Corner




Little Did I Know; an Anthology on Loving and Companioning Young Lives, edited by Vanessa Rush Southern

Inspired by the pandemic and her own teenage daughter's upcoming departure from home, editor Southern set out to collect an anthology of reflections on the spiritual gifts and challenges of raising young people. In reflecting with others, she found an array of life

experiences, choices, struggles, and insights...This inclusive and diverse anthology includes all kinds of families: chosen and biological, extended families, single parents, divorced parents, and more—a beautiful spectrum of people reflecting on the role children and young people have played in their lives and in their larger search for meaning. <u>Little Did I Know</u> goes well beyond the sentimental to an honest reckoning with the vulnerability and beauty of parenting and caregiving.

Julian Is a Mermaid, by Jessica Love

While riding the subway home from the pool with his abuela one day, Julián notices three women spectacularly dressed up. Their hair billows in brilliant hues, their dresses end in fishtails, and their joy fills the train car. When Julián gets home, daydreaming of the magic he's seen, all he can think about is dressing up just like the ladies in his own fabulous mermaid costume: a butter-yellow curtain for his tail, the fronds of a potted fern for his headdress. But what will Abuela think about the mess he makes — and even



more importantly, what will she think about how Julián sees himself? Mesmerizing and full of heart, Jessica Love's author-illustrator debut is a jubilant picture of self-love and a radiant celebration of individuality.

DRE Sabbatical

"Sabbaticals are designed to foster rest, reflection and renewal, and an in-depth respite; to give an opportunity to break away from established routine and the press of heavy responsibilities; to offer a chance to experience different cultures and be stimulated by new learning; and to provide time and space to reflect on the meaning of it all." ~ UUA

The last few years of ministering to our congregation while dancing to the rapidly changing landscape of this pandemic has taken it's toll; I am exhausted and burned out. I am so grateful our congregation has regular sabbaticals as part of my contract for much needed space for deep rest and rejuvenation.

I will be on sabbatical from Jan-June 2023. After an initial month of retreat and rest, I have several areas of study I wish to pursue. One goal is to complete a Pastoral Care Training module I started this month, complete with a final paper about the effects of trauma on the brain. With this learning, I hope to be better able to minister to congregants who have experienced personal trauma and/or to those of us who are dealing with the various effects the trauma of the pandemic has had on our lives.

I plan continued learning and growing in my personal anti-racism journey and to bring that back into my work at People's Church as we work together to dismantle white supremacy culture and build the Beloved Community.

Our religious education committee is strong and capable and they will help to oversee many aspects of our religious education program in my absence. Look for more details and information over the next few months.

This is a rich opportunity for everyone to step up and support religious education in our community.






There are new refugees arriving regularly. We are currently open M-F 9-3:00 by appointment.


We are especially in need of children's clothing, (especially
