Every week, the preschool class at People's Church lights a chalice with the words 'We



for being a helpful helper. There will also be a chance to sign up to offer care (such as meals, rides, and visits) to other folks when the need arises.


April 23 Earth Day All Ages Service People's Youth, the Green Sanctuary Committee, and Rev. Rachel

From the Board

to share an important update on Article III of the People's Church bylaws.

On February 27, 2022, following a two year period of work by a board appointed committee, a significant

majority of our congregational members voted to adopt a revised set of bylaws, including:

Article III – Commitment to Equity

- I. People's Church is deeply committed to the principle of the inherent worth and dignity of every person. We affirm the need to dismantle all forms of oppression and commit to changing ourselves, our organization, and our society by:
- a. Building an environmentally just, wholly diverse, multicultural Beloved Community that accountably dismantles racism and all forms of oppression.
- b. Assuring every action, policy, and practice governing and operating this congregation aligns with the values of People's Church Board of Trustees diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- 2. Our success will be known by our actions. Reflections on the validity and effectiveness of our actions will be informed by and centered on the lived experiences of those who identify as marginalized.

Following the vote, a group of congregants met with a special committee of the board and Rev. Rachel to discuss their concerns regarding the language in Article III. In 2022, a series of Congregational Conversations were held so we could engage in careful, thoughtful discussions and deep listening, and as a way to reconnect after the pandemic kept the church closed - and us apart - for so long.

During this process, the board decided to pause policy work specifically related to Article III. We want to emphasize that social/racial justice policy work not specifically related to this article has continued.

After a year of discussion and listening, the consensus among board members is to move forward with the adopted bylaws language, and that it is time to begin the working of drafting policies related to Article III. We invite anyone interested in helping

The members of the Board of Trustees are writing guide this work to join us.

We want to emphasize the highest authority in the church is the congregation's membership acting at congregational meetings. The congregation approved the bylaws and elected the board. We trust the wisdom of our congregation.

We close with an appreciation for how deeply People's people care about our church, and for the time and effort the Bylaws Committee undertook in drafting our current bylaws. We are grateful that so many in our church community participated in Congregational Conversations, and thankful to board members Tom Hackley, Donna McClurkan and Karen Friedel for engaging in and helping lead those conversations.

People's Church updated our bylaws and policies last year to allow for broader participation in congregational meetings. We now vote online and by mail. In this session, Barb Davis, our church parliamentarian, will offer a refresher on (or introduction to, if you're newer among us) the process we use for congregational meetings. Please note that this session is entirely about the process of congregational meetings,



not the topics that will be discussed. There will be sessions to learn more about the church budget for the coming fiscal year and other agenda items in the weeks before the annual congregational meeting. A light lunch and childcare are provided for this session.

Stewardship Update

Our Stewardship drive for 2023-24 is especially critical to the future of Peoples Church. We suffered serious programmatic and financial losses during the pandemic, when we were closed to in-person attendance. Fortunately, we were able to qualify for Federal government assistance through the Paycheck Protection Program for both 2021 and 2022 which offset our lagging income. But the sad fact is that our

regular pledge income declined by \$10k in 2020-21, \$15k in 2021-22, and \$25k

so far in 2022-23.

Now we are ready to start building our programs and pledge support again. The Stewardship Committee has asked us for a 10% increase in our pledges for next year. That is justified by our recent history, and will also support the beginning

of a transition to the new UUA Congregational Salary Program. In November 2022 the UUA Office of Church Staff Finances released the details of this new program featuring economic justice, individual equity, and salary alignment and predictability based on job level rather than job title.

We have a Board-appointed committee evaluating this program for adoption by People's Church. If adopted, it will improve our internal equity, standardize compensation levels, and simplify our wage and salary administration. It will also cost us at least 10 percent more than we are paying our staff right now. Thus, I urge you to dig deep to try and make that 10% increase in your pledge level for 2023-24. As of Friday March 31st. we have received 117 pledges for a total of \$246,390.




Nominating Committee Nominees

ISAAC Update

Many important efforts are underway: With ISAAC advocacy, Gun Violence Prevention was declared a public health crisis. Funds for youth-oriented prevention programs were moved from the City to United Way to assure that program recipients are competent to conduct this work effectively and accountably for impact.

Brother Ed Genesis has been hired by ISAAC to lead the grass roots BLOCKS Club (Building Leadership and Organizing Community for Kids to Succeed) and other trauma-informed and impacting interventions for youth violence prevention and engagement work.

On April 23rd from 3 – 5pm (light meal served) the Blocks Club is partnering with the WMU Lewis



Walker Institute to co-host the first Youth Juvenile Justice Fellows fundraising event, **Dine \$ Justice** at the Bernhard Center. Special Guest motivational speaker **Eric Thomas** (aka ET), author of You Owe You

will participate as keynote speaker. Tickets at https://tinyurl.com/DINE4JUSTICE.

Several excellent training opportunities have been developed and are available to ISAAC members; Healing Whiteness, Addressing Internalized Racial Oppression (IRO for BIPOC) and Internalized Racial Supremacy (IRS for whites), and wellness activities for people leading justice work.

The slate of officers for the next 2-year terms of the ISAAC Executive Committee was proposed and supported. Each member congregation is encouraged to have two members identified to attend the monthly Leadership Board meetings on the 2nd Tuesday evening of each month. Special Collection: April 16th

The special collection for April will benefit Southwest Michigan land Conservancy's (SWMLC) Stewardship Fund to support their efforts to promote climate resilience. SWMLC, a local nonprofit conservation organization, works with people in the community to improve habitat, protect water quality, support biodiversity, connect people with nature, and conserve the landscapes – prairies, forests, dunes, wetlands - of our region. SWMLC works in the 9 counties of southwest Michigan.

To achieve climate resilience, people and wildlife need healthy local natural areas. SWMLC and partners have developed a strategic map called Nature's Network, to guide land protection efforts by identifying key areas to protect water quality, biodiversity, and habitat connectivity https://swmlc.org/how-were-planning/

Donations and grants fund the protection and stewardship of over 18,000 acres, with 18 public nature preserves open year-round with no admission fees. Protecting these lands in perpetuity requires financial support not only to purchase properties but also for their ongoing stewardship – habitat restoration, invasive species removal, planting native species, and maintaining public infrastructure for trails, signage, and parking lots.

out (there might be extras!) Puzzles are great fun for everyone, good for cognitive skills and stress relief! Join us for lots of fun!






Getting Good at Getting Older book study




from planning experiences for all age groups. Please talk to us if this sounds like fun to you! Mary Kate Webster




A COLLAGE COLLABORATIVE

Collages may be created of various materials, and images, both borrowed and original.
