One of the handouts I provide to participants in our Inquirers Classes is 'When to Call Your Minister.' I thought it might be a good reminder for all People's people. Here are some times when you might want to call me:

- You or a family member are ill.
- You want your minister to know you better – or you want to know your minister better.
- You, someone you are close to, or a church member are in the hospital.
- You are experiencing a life crisis and need to talk.
- You are celebrating a joy and want to share it.
- You have a child you wish to have dedicated.
- You have a concern about our religious community – or an appreciation.
- You are considering joining the congregation.
- You are struggling with grief, loss, or change.
- You are pregnant and glad you are, or pregnant and wish you weren't, or you are dealing with infertility.
- You want to talk about your beliefs and spiritual journey, or you are seeking spiritual growth.
- You are facing a difficult decision.
- Your children (or grandchildren or other children in your life) have spiritual questions and you want help answering them – or want the minister to meet with all of you.
- You are planning to be married, or you are challenged by the demands of marriage, or you are planning to separate or get a divorce.
- You would like to discuss your wishes for a memorial service or other preparations for the end of your life.
- You are feeling alone and want to be reminded of the support you have.

Offering care and support to People's people is my

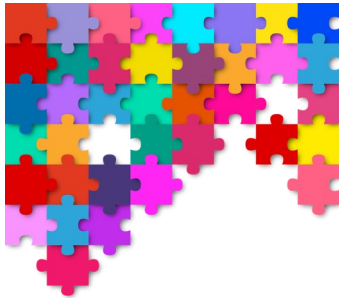
Thank You for a Wonderful Silent Auction

Masks No Longer Mandatory

The People's Church regathering team met on January 24, 2023 and given the high rates of vaccination in our church community and the currently low rates of COVID transmission in Kalamazoo County, we have made some adjustments to our procedures and expectations of one another.

Beginning on February 5th, MASKS ARE NO LONGER REQUIRED at People's Church – including on Sunday mornings during service and Religious Education classes. Anyone is, of course, still welcome to bring and wear a mask based on their own needs and preferences. We will also no longer be using the COVID screening/sign in forms at the welcome table on Sunday mornings.



We know that everyone is assessing the risks of this moment differently and making the choices that are right for them. We will continue to offer multi-platform services for the foreseeable future as well as many programs, groups, and meetings on Zoom. We are committed to following scientific and public health guidance as we navigate this moment and will give people accurate information about what they can expect at church so they can make informed choices. We strive to be as accessible as we can be to everyone in our People's Church community.

March Special Collection: Kalamazoo Loaves & Fishes Sunday March 12

Kalamazoo Loaves & Fishes got its start in several downtown Kalamazoo congregations in the early 1980's. A group of individuals recognized that their neighbors were struggling to put food on the table so they took up the charge to fill the food gap. What they didn't know at the time is that their initiative to lend a hand would have a profound impact on our community. Today, those efforts have grown into an organization that, while no longer religiously affiliated, welcomes people of all faiths. With help from people of all beliefs and backgrounds, Loaves & Fishes provides an average of 700 people with groceries each day.



Kalamazoo Loaves & Fishes is a 'Food Bank Plus.' This means that Loaves & Fishes acquires food through donations and their pennies-on-the-pound purchasing power, and distribute food at 77 distribution sites throughout Kalamazoo County via five food programs.

How to Search the People’s Church Library Catalog from Home

The instructions below are listed in People’s Church website (peopleschurch.net). Find Engage with Us in the blue strip above the large photo of the church. Choose Church Library Catalog from the drop down menu.

Go to www.librarything.com/catalog/peopleschurchofkzoo

Decide which collection you’d like to search (Examples: Main Church Library=adult titles; RE Library=children’s titles) and select it from the list in the upper left.

Near the upper right in the box next to the yellow word ‘Search’, enter a title or author or simple desired topic.

Use the book’s Dewey call number in the left hand column to locate the book in People’s library. People’s Library collection is located in the upper foyer to the left of the door into the Commons. The books are divided into Main Church Library (adult) and RE Library (children’s).

The Main Church Library begins to the left of the middle of the back wall and continues (left to right, in ascending Dewey call numbers) across the aisle to the right end of the low bookshelves and then around to the front of the bookcase, ending with B (biographies).

The RE Library begins in the middle of the front side of the low bookshelves, ending with RE picture books and fiction (J).

A Gift and a Blessing: Teaching RE at People's Church

Every week, at least a dozen dedicated People's People take on the task of teaching our children and youth. It can be difficult work, but also so rewarding. Teachers get to know People's children, build relationships with them, and become trusted adults for kids who are growing and learning the ways of our church community. Two of our teachers agreed to share some of those experiences.



From Dawn Chamberlain, who has been teaching for many years at many different grade levels:

I have been an RE teacher at People's Church since 2009 and it has been my family's church home longer than that! I am lucky to have the opportunity to see our three boys grow and develop into themselves with the support of People's community. I have so enjoyed teaching many ages over the years. With younger children I have taught meditation and exposed them to nature based religious concepts. With our upper elementary aged children, we used the UU and Harry Potter curriculum to make potions for meditation practice! During middle school years we visited other churches and religions to explore beyond our walls. I have also participated in the high school coming of age ritual

where People's encourages youth to seek out their own beliefs and follow what feels most comfortable to them. No matter what, teaching at People's provides a loving space for children, youth, and young adults to cherish the importance of listening during our roses and thorns/joys and sorrows experiences together and building a classroom community which becomes so much more. We weathered through virtual classes and an entire year with our classroom outdoors! Teaching also has helped me grow right along with the children which I will always treasure.



From Don Miller, who has been teaching and guiding our youth for many years:

I began teaching RE around the time Diane Melvin became director and she and I travelled together to Indiana for middle school OWL training. But I was probably a HS youth leader a little before that. Some of my more memorable experiences came in a trip taken with six youth, Rev. Jill and Beth Bullmer to England. I was one of the designated drivers" with my four passengers (of a car with a stick shift and managing that with the left hand). It was a rainy day and I was following Rev. Jill and had to slow down going up- hill on a steep curve. I stalled and every time I tried to let off the brake to use the clutch would

roll back. A semi- truck was behind me and the driver became impatient and began honking – soon there was a string of cars behind us. It's hard to say how many times I tried to get moving and finally figured I needed to straighten my wheels on the wet road to get traction but finally did. The youth chided me later over dinner about the colorful language I directed at the car and the truck and the wet road. And we all laughed! I suppose that was a good example of why I like teaching – finding oneself in discussions, life experiences with youth, being vulnerable feeling humble with them and realizing how important that is for them to witness in adults outside their families. It is a unique relationship of learning together I think and a gift and strength that our church has to offer.

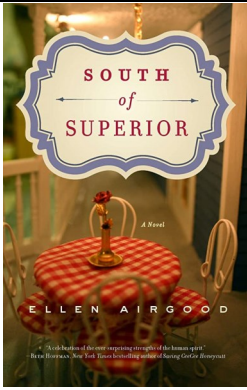

- Toys



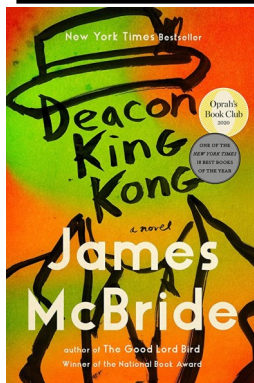
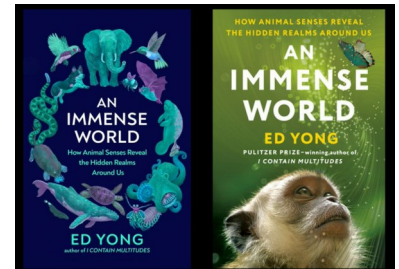
