From the Minister



Dear People's people,
For me, July brings a
welcome slowness after a
frantic spring season.
Without preparing full
sermons most weeks, I have
time and capacity for deeper
thinking, planning, and study
and collaboration — and to
take breaks.

I will be on vacation in early July – July 3 to 9. My best friend and her family will be visiting from Oregon. I am excited to show them Kalamazoo.

I will be taking study leave the weeks of July 10, July 24, and July 31. These are weeks that I am 'released' from regular responsibilities (though if you have a meeting scheduled with me during that time, you can still expect me to show up). I'm planning to read a few books, take an online course on preventing clergy sexual misconduct (a class on this topic is required of me every three years to remain in good standing as a Unitarian Universalist minister), prepare worship themes for the first half of the church year, and make plans to implement some of the policies implemented by the board over the last year.

If you would like to join me in study this summer, I invite you to read On Repentance and Repair: Making Amends in an Unapologetic World by Danya Ruttenberg. This excellent book by a Reform Rabbi was the inspiration for our service on 'The Art of Apology' last February. It has also been selected as the UUA Common Read for the upcoming church year. We will likely have a class for adults on this book in the coming year. The Kalamazoo and Portage Public Libraries both have paper copies. E-books and Audiobooks are available in the regular places. Please let me know if you

read this book and would like to be part of a conversation about it in the fall.


Getting Good at Getting Older book study

Year End Special Collections Update

September 2022: Lincoln School: \$1,354

For many years People's people have been inter-



twined with the students and staff at Lincoln Elementary. We hold a special annual collection for them at the beginning of the

church/school year.

October 2022: YWCA Reproductive Health Fund: \$1,142

The YWCA Reproductive Health Fund enables all

Kalamazoo County residents to access reproductive, sexual, and gender-affirming health care services - especially those who identify as Black,



Indigenous, people of color (BIPOC), undocumented people, low-income people, and those who identify as LGBTQIA+.

November 2022: Black Lives Matter: \$1,103



This grassroots chapter is serving the Black communities of Battle Creek and Kalamazoo, MI. Committed to being transparent with contributions, we aim to include the needs of *all* Black lives

in our communities, especially the most marginalized.

December 2022: Ministry with Community: \$1,117

Ministry with Community is one of our traditional

yearly recipients. MWC is a daytime shelter and resource center in downtown Kalamazoo. They are open 365 days



a year to anyone who needs their services, including those experiencing homelessness, poverty, substance use disorder, and other crises.

January 2023: Community Homeworks Maternal Wellness and Small Child Pilot Program: \$996

Community Homeworks provides critical home repairs and education to low income



homeowners that allow them to be safe and warm, avoid homelessness, and build generational wealth.

February 2023: OutFront Kalamazoo- Legacy House: \$1,419



The Legacy House is a program of OutFront Kalamazoo. Legacy House offers transitional housing

for LGBTQ+ young adults ages 18-24, who are navigating homelessness in Kalamazoo County.

March 2023: Loaves and Fishes: \$1,315

With help from people of all beliefs and backgrounds, Loaves & Fishes provides an average of 700 people with groceries each day.



April 2023: SWMLC: \$1,215



The special collection for April will benefit Southwest Michigan land Conservancy's (SWMLC) Stewardship Fund to support their efforts to promote climate resilience.

May 2023: El Concilio: \$1,261.25 (plus an additional \$1,887.01 from the People's Church Social Justice Coordinating Committee)

El Concilio serves Latinx residents of Kalamazoo through preschool, translation services, educational mentoring, bilingual counseling, cultural programs and much much more.



June 2022: ISAAC: \$1,447.44



ISAAC (Interfaith Strategy for Advocacy & Action in the Community) is an interfaith organizing group of 30 congregations and strategic partners working together to build a more just community; united to accomplish policy-level changes that could not be done on our own.

Green Spot



On June 1 this year, People's Church marked 3 complete years of electricity production from our solar photovoltaic array. The results are encouraging for our future, both for the

church's finances and for our carbon footprint. On average over those three years we have produced 22,770 kilowatt hours (kWh) per year. This represents over 39% of our electricity usage. All of this electricity is carbon free, as is about 20% of production from Consumers Energy, so approximately ½. of the church's electricity is presently from renewable, non-carbon sources. (The utility's plan is to eliminate all coal production by 2025, and to use 60% renewables by 2040.)

At the current rate of \$0.153 per kilowatt hour, the electricity we produce is worth \$3484 per year, although currently most of that goes toward the purchase of the installation. Once we pay off the loan, all this will benefit the church in the form of lower utility costs. We will be eligible to purchase the balance of our contract on


December 31, 2024, for an agreed upon price of just under \$40,000, or if we wish we can purchase it any year after that for a further reduced price.

The solar sys-

tem is part of a long-range plan of the Green Sanctuary Committee to move the church toward Net Zero carbon. Other efforts have included insulation of the walls in the classroom parts of the original building, LED lighting replacement throughout the building, high efficiency pumps and pipe insulation for the heat distribution from the boiler, and efficiency improvements in the ventilation system. This work is ongoing by the dedicated volunteers of the Building and Grounds committee. If you want to help please contact Tom Hackley.




This chart shows the monthly electricity production over the past 3 years, and the seasonal variation from our solar panels.



How to Search the People's Church Library Catalog from Home


The instructions below are listed in People's Church website (peopleschurch.net). Find Engage with Us in the blue strip above the large photo of the church. Choose Church Library Catalog from the drop down menu.

Go to www.librarything.com/catalog/peopleschurchofkzoo

Decide which collection you'd like to search (Examples: Main Church Library=adult titles; RE Library=children's titles) and select it from the list in the upper left.

Near the upper right in the box pext to the yellow word 'Search' enter a title or

Near the upper right in the box next to the yellow word 'Search', enter a title or author or simple desired topic.



The Main Church Library begins to the left of the middle of the back wall and continues (left to right, in ascending Dewey call numbers) across the aisle to the right end of the low bookshelves and then around to the front of the bookcase, ending with B (biographies).

The RE Library begins in the middle of the front side of the low bookshelves, ending with RE picture books and fiction (J).
































Committal Service for Edmund Tsang
