Harm reduction is a set of practices and policies in public health **REDUCTION** to reduce the negative consequences of human behavior, recognizing that you can't force someone to make different choices, but you can work to make the consequences of their choices less catastrophic. (Needle exchange programs for IV drug SAVES LIVES users is an example of harm reduction.) In this service, Rev.

Rachel will apply the ethics of harm reduction to other areas,

showing how they might help us to live with integrity in this beautiful and broken world. We will also be devoting our special offering to COPE Network, which practices harm reduction in our community.

Dear People's people, As I write to you in late October, we are in the midst of a fall 'minifill a gap in our church annual budget. I wanted to share with you (again, perhaps) part of my sermon for this campaign on October 22:

We are in a time of

churn and transition. The pandemic hit us hard financially, as it did so many. We lost pledges. We lost rental and fundraiser income. We made it through. We participated in the federal Payroll Protection Program to balance our budget for two years. Last year, we asked our most generous givers to give more - and they responded with generosity. We have drawn from our savings and invested funds.

Last spring, when we were building the annual church budget, we couldn't make it work. Church leaders stared at the numbers and couldn't make the expenses as low as the income. We did what we could. We trimmed expenses from an already lean budget. Still there was a gap, a \$60,000 gap. That's about 15% of our roughly \$400,000 annual budget. The members of this church made a promise last spring when you approved a budget with an additional \$40,000 stewardship campaign - and now is the time to make good on this promise.

We can break down our \$40,000 goal in a few ways. It is every person or family who pledged in the spring increasing their pledge by 15%. It is every member giving an extra \$150 more. And we invite people who aren't giving money to the church to start now. Of course, these one-size-fits all number probably won't be right for you. Be generous, whatever that is for you.

My family will be making an additional gift of \$500. Perhaps you can join me at that level – or give or more. We are share our abundance with this com-

munity that helps us raise our children, and other people's children, rooted in our values - as well as everything else that happens in this community.

stewardship' campaign, to Your board, finance leaders, and I have had many conversations in the last six months about how to become a financially sustainable church. We have more questions than answers. Can we continue our commitment to paying all church employees a living wage? How can we move toward our goals of sustainability, paying off our solar panels and reaching our goal of net zero carbon emissions by 2030? Can we continue our current level of staffing? How can we continue to build the Beloved Community within and beyond our walls? How you respond to the campaign over the next few weeks will help us all answer those questions.





How to Search the People's Church Library Catalog from Home

The instructions below are listed on the People's Church website (peopleschurch.net). You can find them here: <u>https://peopleschurch.net/engage-with-us/church-library-catalog/</u>

Go to www.librarything.com/catalog/peopleschurchofkzoo

- Decide which collection you'd like to search (Examples: Main Church Library=adult titles; RE Library=children's titles) and select it from the list in the upper left.
- Near the upper right in the box next to the yellow word 'Search', enter a title or author or simple desired topic.
- Use the book's Dewey call number in the left hand column to locate the book in People's library. People's Library collection is located in the upper foyer to the left of the door into the Commons. The books are divided into Main Church Library (adult) and RE Library (children's).



The Main Church Library begins to the left of the middle of the back wall and continues (left to right, in ascending Dewey call numbers) across the aisle to the right end of the low bookshelves and then around to the front of the bookcase, ending with B (biographies).

The RE Library begins in the middle of the front side of the low bookshelves, ending with RE picture books and fiction (J).




