# December 17: Bread for the Journey: An All Ages Service—Diane Melvin, Director of Religious Education and Rev. Rachel Lonberg



Dear People's people,

Over the month of November. I have seen People's people live their values in powerful ways. moments when I thought to myself how lucky I am to minister with, to, and alongside you.

People's people support one another in times of grief. At the end of the elementary school sleepover, Gryffyn, the beloved dog of Diane Melvin our religious educator, was hit by a car and killed. Within minutes of learning about this terrible death, some of our children were writing notes to Diane about how much This is only a few of the ways we lived our values they loved Gryffyn. Similar notes of care and sympathy were sent to Diane by People's people young and old in the weeks that followed.

People's people envision a world without racism and oppression. In early November, your board of trustees passed an anti-racism policy. You can read it here: <a href="https://peopleschurch.net/">https://peopleschurch.net/</a> about-us/policies-governance/ This policy is designed to help the church begin to live into the anti -racist commitments in the bylaws that were passed in early 2022, which included this language: 'We affirm the need to dismantle all forms of oppression and commit to changing ourselves, our organization, and our society by:

- a. Building an environmentally just, wholly diverse, multicultural Beloved Community that accountably dismantles racism and all forms of oppression.
- b. Assuring every action, policy, and practice governing and operating this congregation aligns with the values of diversity, equity, and inclusion.' Of course, a policy is just another piece of the long work of transforming ourselves and our institution - and it is important, as it will guide the work of the board, staff, committees, and individuals within the church. If you have questions about any of this, please reach out to board members or me.

People's people make hard choices to protect vulnerable people. When COVID spread at People's Church, we took precautions, changed our behavior, and cancelled programs to keep one another safe. By wearing masks, cancelling some events, and encouraging Zoom attendance, we Here are just a few of the stopped the spread of COVID. The actions we took made a difference. Once we became aware of the situation and reacted, COVID spread no further in our community, except for among people who live together. Good work, everyone!


ble enterprise, for providing unceasing help and support with amazingly good humor.



### How to Search the People's Church Library Catalog from Home

The instructions below are listed on the People's Church website (peopleschurch.net). You can find them here: https://peopleschurch.net/engage-with-us/church-library-catalog/

Go to www.librarything.com/catalog/peopleschurchofkzoo

Decide which collection you'd like to search (Examples: Main Church Library=adult titles; RE Library=children's titles) and select it from the list in the upper left.

Near the upper right in the box next to the yellow word 'Search', enter a title or author or simple desired topic.

Use the book's Dewey call number in the left hand column to locate the book in People's library. People's Library collection is located in the upper foyer to the left of the door into the Commons. The books are divided into Main Church Library (adult) and RE Library (children's).

The Main Church Library begins to the left of the middle of the back wall and continues (left to right, in ascending Dewey call numbers) across the aisle to the right end of the low bookshelves and then around to the front of the bookcase, ending with B (biographies).

The RE Library begins in the middle of the front side of the low bookshelves, ending with RE pic-

ture books and fiction (J).



Snuggling in a nest of pillows and sleeping bags followed a fabulous night hike combined with his favorite game of "You


can't catch me!" He soaked up all the love and attention and gave as much love as he received.






### The Inner Work of Age
