February II Happy Birthday, Charles Darwin! Rev. Rachel Lonberg



On the weekend marking the 215th anniversary of the birth of naturalist Charles Darwin, who developed the theory of evolution and who was raised as a Unitarian. We will celebrate his life and legacy of inquiry, science, and trying to make sense of the world around us.

February 18 The Misuse of Science **Rev. Rachel Lonberg**

Following up on the previous Sunday's celebration of Charles Darwin and evolution, we will grapple with how the scientific ideas Darwin developed have been misused in racist, ableist, and imperialist ways. The modern eugenics movement (founded by Charles Darwin's cousin) promoted social policies designed to "improve" human



populations. Many of the early proponents were Unitarians. In this service, we will wrestle with this legacy and explore how science can build Beloved Community.

February 25 Love at the Center Rev. Rachel Lonberg



Our Unitarian Universalist Association is in the process of revising Article II of the bylaws, which includes the principles and sources. In this service, Rev. Call (or Text) your Minister When....

- You or a family member are ill.
- You want your minister to know you better or you want to know your minister better.
- You, someone you are close to, or a church member are in the hospital. (The hospital does not notify the church.)
- You are experiencing a life crisis and need to talk.
- You are celebrating one of life's joys and want to share it.
- You have a child you wish to have dedicated.
- You have a concern about our religious community or an appreciation.
- You are considering joining the congregation.
- You are struggling with grief, loss, or change.
- You are pregnant and glad you are, or pregnant and wish you weren't, or you are dealing with infertility.
- You want to talk about your beliefs and spiritual journey or you are seeking spiritual growth.
- You are facing a difficult decision.
- Your children (or grandchildren or other children in your life) have spiritual questions and you want help answering them or want the minister to meet with all of you.
- You are planning to be married, or you are challenged by the demands of marriage, or you are planning to separate or get a divorce.

- You would like to discuss your wishes for a memorial service.
- You are feeling challenged by your life circumstances and want to talk.
- You are feeling alone and want to be reminded of the support you have.


Library Corner: Black History Month



I Color Myself Different, by Colin Kaepernick RE 305.8 Ka
An inspiring story of identity and self-esteem from celebrated athlete and activist Colin Kaepernick.

The 1619 Project: a New Origin Story, created by Nikole Hannah-Jones and the New York Times Magazine—973 Si

The New York Times Magazine's award-winning 1619 Project issue reframed our understanding of American history by placing slavery and its continuing legacy at the center of our national narrative. This book substantially expands on the that project by weaving together eighteen essays that explore the legacy of slavery in present-day America with thirty-six poems and works of fiction that illuminate key moments of oppression, struggle, and resistance.






The Undefeated, by Kwame Alexander—RE 811.6 Al

Originally performed for ESPN's The Undefeated, this poem is a love letter to black life in the United States. It highlights the unspeakable trauma of slavery, the faith and fire of the civil rights movement, and the grit, passion, and perseverance of some of the world's greatest heroes.

Jefferson's Pillow: the Founding Fathers and the Dilemma of Black Patriotism, by Roger Wilkins—973.09 Wi

Wilkins asserts that the mythic accounts of the American Revolution have ignored slavery and oversimplified history until the heroes, be they the founders or the slaves in their service, are denied any human complexity. He offers a thoughtful analysis of this fundamental paradox through his exploration of the lives of George Washington, George Mason, James Madison, and of course Thomas Jefferson.





When We Say Black Lives Matter, by Maxine Benebe Clarke—J Cl In a powerful, poetic missive, the award-winning author-illustrator celebrates the meaning behind the words Black Lives Matter.

Rise Up! How You Can Join the Fight against White Supremacy, by Crystal Marie Fleming—RE 305.8 FI

This urgent book explores the roots of racism and its legacy in modern day, all while empowering young people with actionable ways they can help foster a better world and become antiracists.

Cycles of the Seasons - Imbolc

One of the gifts of tuning into nature as the wheel of the year turns is what we can observe and learn when we pay attention. In this dark and cold time of year, much of nature is dormant or hibernating, gathering or saving energy for the spring. I see so much wisdom in the cyclical ebb and flow of energy during this time of year.

The beginning of February traditionally marks Imbolc which is a Pagan holiday half way between winter solstice and the spring equinox. It is an ancient Gaelic seasonal festival celebrating the beginning of the turn of the wheel of the year toward spring.

The etymology of Imbolc or Imbolg is unclear but one theory is that it comes from the Old Irish that meant "in the belly" and it refers to this time when the ewes were pregnant with lambs. The holiday was coopted by the Christians who renamed it St. Brigids Day, yet continued many of the old traditions, foods and celebrations

The holiday is traditionally associated with weatherlore and the old tradition of watching to see if serpents or badgers came from their winter dens may be a forerunner of the North American Groundhog Day.

A modern take comes from the 1993 film *Groundhog Day* with Bill Murray acting as a news anchor who keeps waking up repeatedly to the same day. It is this play on Ground Hog day that we adapted for our family potluck and game night, hoping that folks keep coming back for more.

We hope you will join us for a fun evening of community and connection building and to help welcome many of the newer/newish folks to People's Church.

You are welcome to bring a traditional Imbolc dish to pass to celebrate the season or whatever you want. I look forward to seeing all who come for a fun evening together. Childcare providers will be available along with games and crafts.
