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Dear Ones, Earlier this spring, the board of trustees approved my proposal to take a sabbatical in spring/summer 2025. I will be on sabbatical from mid-April to mid-August 2025.

What's a sabbatical? A sabbatical for a religious leader is a time of

deep rest, learning, and spiritual growth. It is a time to move through the world more slowly and mend connections to what matters most in my life that have frayed due to the day-to-day demands of ministry.

What am I going to do?

I have several plans for my sabbatical. (Writing about these plans makes me nervous, as my last sabbatical was in 2021 and I spent it facilitating remote kindergarten, not engaging in the projects I hoped for.)

I planning to rest, engage in spiritual practices, read and learn. I am also hoping to write a romance novel. Romance novels have become a source of joy and comfort to me in recent years and I've been slowly working on writing a story. I've never written anything as long as a book before and I'm excited to see what I might be able to accomplish when my best writing energy isn't devoted to sermons, reports, emails and newsletter articles.

I am also hoping to travel to Europe with my spouse and children. My brother and his family moved to Haarlem, The Netherlands almost a year ago (leaving Idaho for a safer place to raise my transgender niece). I want to see them. Depending on our budget, we'd also like to visit one of my spouse's good friends in Belgium and return to Serbia, where I lived for two years twenty years ago and where my call to ministry took shape.

What will happen at People's Church without Rev.

Rachel?

People's Church will thrive in my absence. You all have navigated sabbaticals before and we will use a similar approach to what we did when I went on sabbatical in 2021. You all will fill the 'Rev.-Rachelshaped-hole' I leave behind in a variety of ways. Diane Melvin and the board will take on the administrative tasks. Guest preachers and People's people will lead Sunday services (look for a sermon writing class adult religious education class coming this fall!) A team of church folks with support from a local clergyperson or minister will support church folks who are facing loss, grief, and other challenging circumstances. We will begin organizing all of this in late summer and early fall.

I wanted to tell you about this sabbatical now so we have plenty of time to ask questions and plan together – and because you will see some of the costs of the sabbatical in the 2024-2025 budget. (The sabbatical will happen across the next two church fiscal years.) Please let me know if you have any questions about this – or if you have ideas for how to make the church's time while I am away especially meaningful.



Rain Garden Update


The People's Church rain garden was created last fall, thanks to the Green Sanctuary Committee and the hard work of many volunteers led by Kimberly Ginn, who is a certified Master Rain Gardener. This garden collects rain runoff into a basin, where the water infiltrates the ground, is cleaned and eventual-

ly flows into our aquifer. Roots from plants in a rain garden will filter contaminants from the parking lots. Our rain garden will be filled with native plants-those that have evolved to thrive in our area and climate. These flowers and grasses provide habitat for pollinators and other wildlife. They are attractive to humans, too! However, the basin we dug last September has proved to be too small to handle the volume of rain the area holds, so the adventure continues. This spring we plan to enlarge the garden, install more



drains, and add more plants. These steps will help the area absorb the water that naturally collects there, leading to the garden's success. Volunteers will be needed to help "grow" our rain garden, so be on the lookout for details as we approach planting season. Participating in this project is a fun way to connect with People's people while doing meaningful work. In addition, if anyone has a sod cutter or a small earth mover they'd be willing to loan, or native plants to donate, please contact Kimberly or a member of the Green Sanctuary Committee.

Book Study and Conversation: The Inner Work of Age: Shifting from Role to Soul by Connie Zweig








Evening Book Club—Newcomers Welcome!

Inasmuch as May is Mental Health Month, this month's article highlights several of People's Library books which address mental health issues.




"How Not to Be Afraid; Seven Ways to Live When Everything Seems Terrifying", by Gareth Higgins—152.46 Hi

This delightfully cuddly book gives us a warm and friendly look at some of the best kinds of hugs around.






"Quiet; the Power of Introverts in a World That Can't Stop Talking", by Susan Cain—155.2 Ca

There is quite a bit of work involved, but it is stretched out over time, done at the convenience of the co-leaders' schedules, and truly delightful to work with our artists and our amazing Bazaar team. It is an honor to represent our church in this role and it is a great practice for building patience, discernment, and tact. 


Mowers Needed!



UU Women's Retreat




