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

Chalice Circles can enrich your connections



Around two years ago I joined a Chalice Circle, newly formed, of eight people whose ages spanned fifty years, three generations. We met monthly using a UUA booklet with lessons and a volunteer group leader. During our gatherings, we discussed topics and responded to cues, speaking our feelings from our own perspectives and experience, not responding directly to each other. Our age spread was a real advantage and offered us insights into our own times of life and our sharing proved helpful to young and old. Over time we bonded deeply, becoming close friends, offering love, connection and support for each other. And after two years I announced that I was leaving the group. We developed bonds among us which will last. And now I want to begin again with another

cross-generational group as we open our hearts and share our deepest feelings. I want to get to know more people deeply as those bonds develop over time.


Evening Book Club—Newcomers Welcome!

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Library Corner

How to Check Out a Book from the Library

- I. Open the front cover of the book.
- 2. Note the card in the pocket. Remove the card. Occasionally the card and pocket are inside the back cover of the book.
- 3. Print the full day's date in the left column of the card.
- 4. Print your name in the right column.
- 5. Add your email address and phone number. Use another line if necessary.
- Locate the open wooden box which is on the window side of the far right bookshelf near the double doors to the Commons. A wire basket is above this shelf.
- 7. Place the book card in front of the right portion of the box.
- 8. To return the book, place it in the wire basket above the wooden box. Library committee members will replace the card and re-shelve the book.

How to Search the People's Church Library Catalog from Home

The instructions below are listed in People's Church website (peopleschurch.net). Find

'Learning' in the blue strip above the large photos. Choose Church Library Catalog from the drop down menu.

- I. Go to www.librarything.com/catalog/peopleschurchofkzoo
- 2. Decide which collection you'd like to search (Examples: Main Church Library=adult titles; RE Library=children's titles) and select it from the list in the upper left.
- 3. Near the upper right in the box next to the yellow word 'Search', enter a title or author or simple desired topic.
- 4. Use the book's Dewey call number in the left hand column to locate the book in People's library. People's Library collection is located in the upper foyer to the left of the door into the Commons. The books are divided into Main Church Library (adult) and RE Library (children's).
- 5. The Main Church Library begins to the left of the middle of the back wall and continues (left to right, in ascending Dewey call numbers) across the aisle to the right end of the low bookshelves and then around to the front of the bookcase, ending with B (biographies). The RE Library begins in the middle of the front side of the low bookshelves, ending with RE picture books and fiction (J).

We embrace our differences and commonalities with Love, curiosity, and respect.

lustice - We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all thrive.

We covenant to dismantle racism and all forms of systemic oppression. We support the use of inclusive democratic processes to make decisions within our congregations, our Association, and society at large.

Transformation - We adapt to the changing world.

We covenant to collectively transform and grow spiritually and ethically. Openness to change is

fundamental to our Unitarian and Universalist heritages, never complete and never perfect.

Generosity - We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope.

We covenant to freely and compassionately share our faith, presence, and resources. Our generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality.

Equity - We declare that every person has the right to flourish with inherent dignity and

Status Report on Net-Zero Project from the Green Sanctuary Committee For the last several years, based on the Net Zero Carbon initiative from the Green Sanctuary Com-

mittee, a small group of dedicated members of the Building & Grounds Team (Thank you Tom, Gary H, Gary L, Steve, Bob D,, Bob F., Andy, Roger, George, Martin & Rick!) have been working on upgrading the energy efficiency of People's Church. Everyone has heard about the addition of the solar array on the roof, but that is far from the whole story.



The insulation in our walls has been upgraded, room by room as part of the renovation; air leaks have been fixed as they



have been uncovered; light fixtures have been upgraded from incandescent to LED bulbs; new pumps and pipe insulation has been added to the hot water heating system, ventilation in the commons has been improved, and many other details addressed as they have been discovered. This is a progress report on those efforts, including an update on the output of our solar array.

Walls have been re-insulated, and wallboard replaced and painted all the

way around to the Southern wing of the old building (rooms 1-8, and 10). This work was temporarily stopped when a serious problem was discovered in the nursery. But these upgrades have had a signifi-

cant impact on our energy consumption, as well as sprucing up the old spaces. And they will continue as labor time and materials costs are available.

The results have been very significant: Our natural gas consumption over the last 12 months (April 2023 through March 2024), shows a 16% reduction compared to the 2017-19 baseline (pre-solar installation, pre-Covid closure) through these efforts!



Our electricity consumption in kilowatt hours, due both to the solar array addition in 2020 and the other efficiency improvements, has been reduced by 39% since the baseline!

The improved building performance has resulted in a "Cool Congregations" award from Interfaaith



Power and Light, a \$1000 prize in the planning category, also from Interfaith Power and Light, and a \$500 award from the American Council for an Energy-Efficient Economy. This wonderful performance has not been widely publicized among People's Church members and friends!

Based upon current budget levels, we are realizing an estimated net reduction of \$4,000 in annual utility costs. But the job is not yet done! The remaining walls need to be completed, we need to pay off the purchase price of the solar array, and many other details are still awaiting treat-

ment. We also hope in the future to convert our HVAC systems to all electric heat pumps, and perhaps add to the solar capacity as part of our long-range Net Zero Carbon initiative.
