This summer, the General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association adopted a new statement of values. These values are Justice, Equity, Transformation, Pluralism, Interdependence, and Generosity with love at the center. (JETPIG is a handy pneumonic to help us remember.) In this service, we will kick-off a focus on these values that will continue throughout this year.

Dear ones,

Recently, I spoke with a People's person who received a tricky question from a coworker about our community. He wanted to learn how others answer this question. (Some of you might have seen part of

this in our People's Perpetual Coffee Hour Face-book group.) After I responded to him, I thought it might be worthwhile to share my answer to this question in the newsletter for everyone.

Is People's Church part of a Christian denomination?

The short answer is "no" -- People's Church is not part of a Christian denomination.

Here is the longer answer:

People's Church is part of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations, which is not a denomination, technically, but lots of people call it one. (The difference has to do with church governance structures.) The UUA is the group of about 1,000 congregations that we partner with on things like training religious professionals, developing curriculum, and best practices for navigating a pandemic that would be very hard to do on our own. We also collaborate with other congregations – like for the upcoming UU Climate lustice Revival.

Both People's Church and the UUA are not Christian organizations, though we have Christian members. We include people with lots of different beliefs who choose to be together, united by shared values, principles, and promises. We do not all believe the same thing — or say that we believe the same thing—which makes us unusual in the American religious landscape.

To make this even more complicated (because that's just what we need, right?) both People's Church and the UUA used to be Christian, though we haven't been a Christian tradition for the last 100 years or so. Because of our Christian heritage many of the words we use (like church

and minister) and practices we have (gathering on Sunday mornings, our order of service) reflect this... and the words 'Unitarian' and 'Universalism' are both words for specific Christian beliefs about God, words we still claim even though those be-

liefs aren't what's most important to us now. Understandably, all of this can make us a little hard for a coworker to understand us.

I'm grateful that this People's person brought their question to me. One of the things that I know is true is that whenever someone comes to me with a question, a wondering, or a struggle there are several other people in a similar situation. If you have a question you don't know how to answer, an ethical quandary, a theological conundrum, or anything similar, please send it my way. We can talk it through – and, with your permission – it might become the topic of a future newsletter column or worship service.

WOW!!! Thank you to the whole People's Church Community for helping us reach financial sustainability!

Last year we started out needing to cover a substantial deficit. So we got to work: we plowed the soil, planted the seeds, fertilized the garden, and pulled the weeds. Then a miracle happened! When all was said and done our year-end budget showed a

SURPLUS!! How did this happen? It happened because everyone involved with People's Church pitched in:

- you, our members, responded to two calls for increased pledges by exceeding our most optimistic hopes;
- our church administrator increased the rental income by more than 100%;
- our fundraising committees increased their revenues by more than a third;
- our staff and committees were able to hold their expenditures well below their proposed budgets while still fulfilling their missions.

The result of this community effort was a \$15,077 INCREASE in projected revenues, AND, a \$14,442 REDUCTION in budgeted expenditures. We were able to put money into our rainy day fund (the

Palmer Fund) instead of drawing money out, for the first time since before the Covid pandemic. To every one of you a big THANK YOU! Pat yourselves on the back, take a breath of relief, and let's continue making this the best church community it can be.


People's People Invited to LWVKA GOTV Postcard Party


IET-PIG

Around two years ago I joined a Chalice Circle, newly formed, of eight people whose ages spanned fifty years, three generations. We met monthly using a UUA booklet with lessons and a volunteer group leader. During our gatherings, we discussed topics and responded to cues, speaking our feelings from our own perspectives and experience, not responding directly to each other. Our age spread was a real advantage and offered us insights into our own times of life and our sharing proved helpful to young and old. Over time we bonded deeply, becoming close



friends, offering love, connection and support for each other. And after two years I announced that I was leaving the group.

We developed bonds among us which will last. And now I want to begin again with another cross-generational group as we open our hearts and share

our deepest feelings. I want to get to

know more people deeply as those bonds develop over time.

I hope that new Chalice Circle groups will form, a perfect environment for people in our

community to really get to know each other through mindful sharing. It's been a very fulfilling

experience for me and now I want to build deep bonds with others in our church community.





Afternoon Book Club



Six Unitarian Universalists share about their connections with Jesus, demonstrating the variety of views from across the faith.












How to Check Out a Book from the Library



2. Note the card in the pocket. Remove the card. Occasionally the card and pocket are inside the back cover of the book.

- 3. Print the full day's date in the left column of the card.
- 4. Print your name in the right column.
- 5. Add your email address and phone number. Use another line if necessary.
- 6. Locate the open wooden box which is on the window side of the far right bookshelf near the double doors to the Commons. A wire basket is above this shelf.
- 7. Place the book card in front of the right portion of the box.
- 8. To return the book, place it in the wire basket above the wooden box. Library committee members will replace the card and re-shelve the book.



World Religions

Come to the Climate Justice Revival!

When thinking about the climate crisis, I often feel like a deer in the headlights, paralyzed by dread as a terrible danger rushes toward me. I find that the best antidotes to climate anxiety and paralysis are being part of a community that shares my concerns and engaging in collective action. But there is another necessity: a vision of a just and joyful future. So often, it seems as if climate action is simply a way to make things slightly "less bad." How different would it feel to be striving toward a beautiful, inclusive, sustainable future instead?

That is the goal of the nation-wide UU Climate Justice Revival, which we will participate in this September. People's Church and the Unitarian Universalist Community Church will collaborate to reimagine what it would mean to shift from our Extractive Age toward a New Era of community care and wellbeing.

We will gather together to learn and reflect as a community. Facilitated discussions for adults and ageappropriate activities for children and youth will deepen our understandings about climate change, social inequities, community needs, personal strengths, and collective capacities. And the kids don't have a monopoly on fun activities: the adults will get to create maps and use art (no talent required) to augment exploration of how the effects of climate change intersect with justice issues in our community.

This Revival is not just about seeing problems, it is about deepening our understanding so we can better identify ways to take meaningful action. We cannot transform the world by ourselves, however, we can discern what our congregations have to offer to address our community's most pressing needs. And together, we can reflect on the diverse skills, experiences, knowledge, and innate gifts that individual members of our community can contribute to our combined efforts. No one person can do it all, but together we can envision what it would mean to transform our community into a place with a thriving ecosystem where all people are cared for.

My life in art was transformed in 1973 when I enrolled in a design class at Mt. Mary College in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The teacher was a well-known artist and nun, Sister Mary Remy. She was recognized for her creative designs and joyful teaching. She taught design using silk screen printing on fabric as the medium.



We were taught in order to create designs, observation was the key, that everything in sight had the possibility to become a creative image, so our sketches evolved into remarkable designs. Organizing the designs on fabric created endless options. I was enthralled with the process and the seemingly limitless opportunities to experiment.

This fascination led me to explore printed, quilted, woven, and tapestry mediums bringing much joy to my life. My designs are sourced from the mountains, waterways, woods, and creatures I encounter while wandering, paddling, or digging in my own garden.

This exhibit brings together many of the creative approaches that I have explored over my years as an artist.


