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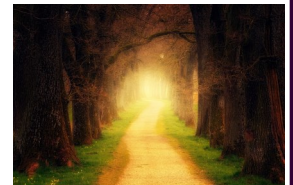

October 6: "Crossing Paths" - Rev. Rachel Lonberg

As Unitarian Universalists, we celebrate that we are all sacred beings, diverse in culture, experience, and theology. As our programs for children and youth begin (with a focus on world religions this year), Rev. Rachel will reflect on the gift of religious pluralism and how learning about other wisdom traditions can strengthen our faith.



October 13: "Sanctity in Reproductive Justice" - Denise Cawley

Thirty years ago, 12 Black women created a framework for Reproductive Justice that says the right to raise a child, to not to have a child, to raise children we do have in safe and sustainable communities, and to maintain bodily autonomy is a human right. For us as Unitarian Universalists, there is a broader theological and moral calling to share our faith, our sex-positive view points, our dedication to body autonomy, values of anti-racism, and pro-abortion positions, with dominative narratives in our communities and in the media. Learn about this history and how we can advocate values of our faith without letting more narrow views in the national and local conversations, sacrifice these basic human reproductive rights.



October 20: "Becoming People of Love" - Rev. Rachel Lonberg

At a wedding, perhaps you heard the classic text from the Christian Scripture that includes, 'love is patient, love is kind,' but did you know that these words were originally part of a letter to an unruly church telling them to behave themselves. In this service, Rev. Rachel will explore this ancient wisdom about what it means to be a 'People of Love' in conversation with the wisdom of the much more modern teacher bell hooks.



October 27: "Satan and Other (D)evils" - Rev. Rachel Lonberg

In honor of Halloween, Rev. Rachel will trace the surprising history of Satan (he's not a fallen angel; he didn't start out as a villain) and consider how personifying evil might keep us from fully recognizing our own destructive potential as humans.



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Dear ones,

Recently, I spoke with a People's person who received a tricky question from a coworker about our community. He wanted to learn how others answer this question. (Some of you might have seen part of

this in our People's Perpetual Coffee Hour Facebook group.) After I responded to him, I thought it might be worthwhile to share my answer to this question in the newsletter for everyone.

Is People's Church part of a Christian denomination?

The short answer is "no" -- People's Church is not part of a Christian denomination.

Here is the longer answer:

People's Church is part of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations, which is not a denomination, technically, but lots of people call it one. (The difference has to do with church governance structures.) The UUA is the group of about 1,000 congregations that we partner with on things like training religious professionals, developing curriculum, and best practices for navigating a pandemic that would be very hard to do on our own. We also collaborate with other congregations -- like for the upcoming UU Climate Justice Revival. Both People's Church and the UUA are not Christian organizations, though we have Christian members. We include people with lots of different beliefs who choose to be together, united by shared values, principles, and promises. We do not all believe the same thing -- or say that we believe the same thing—which makes us unusual in the American religious landscape.

To make this even more complicated (because that's just what we need, right?) both People's Church and the UUA used to be Christian, though we haven't been a Christian tradition for the last 100 years or so. Because of our Christian heritage many of the words we use (like church and minister) and practices we have (gathering on Sunday

mornings, our order of service) reflect this... and the words 'Unitarian' and 'Universalism' are both words for specific Christian beliefs about God, words we still claim even though those beliefs aren't what's most important to us now. Understandably, all of this can make us a little hard for a coworker to understand us. I'm grateful that this People's person brought their question to me. One of the things that I know is true is that whenever someone comes to me with a question, a wondering, or a struggle there are several other people in a similar situation. If you have a question you don't know how to answer, an ethical quandary, a theological conundrum, or anything similar, please send it my way. We can talk it through -- and, with your permission -- it might become the topic of a future newsletter column or worship service.

In our September board meeting, we voted to adopt the 2025 Restatement of the Unitarian Universalist Organizations Retirement Plan. This update aligns with new laws and enhances equity while ensuring no financial impact on our church. This change allows us to continue supporting our staff's retirement planning.

We are a beloved community who cares for each other deeply. Your act of generosity

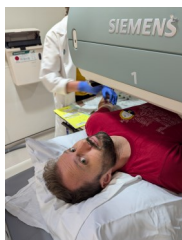

As our new church year begins, it seems a good time for a reminder on the benefits and functions of our People's rain garden.

-to improve stormwater management because climate change means heavier, more concentrated rainfall events and we need to reduce the amount of water going into storm drains;
-ecological restoration, by adding native plants that support biodiversity (insects, birds, toads, etc.), sequester carbon in the soil, build soil health, help water filtrate into the groundwater system, and all those good things that lawns and pavement do not do;

-provide a venue for education about the ecological and climate benefits of rain gardens (and/or vernal pools).

We have had several planting/weeding sessions this summer, so you might notice a difference in the garden's appearance. Please take time to stop by for a look!

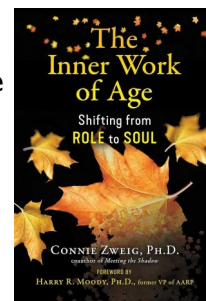

This is our final gathering to discuss *The Inner Work of Age: Shifting from Role to Soul* as our source for conversation.

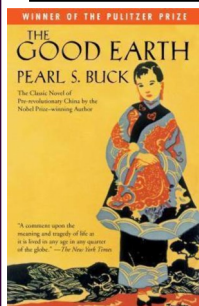
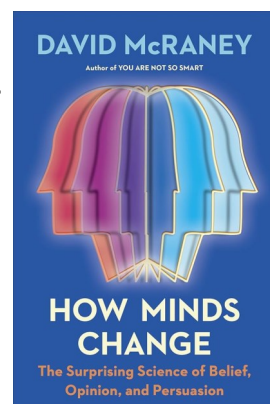

How to Check Out a Book from the Library



1. Open the front cover of the book.
2. Note the card in the pocket. Remove the card. Occasionally the card and pocket are inside the back cover of the book.
3. Print the full day's date in the left column of the card.
4. Print your name in the right column.
5. Add your email address and phone number. Use another line if necessary.
6. Locate the open wooden box which is on the window side of the far right bookshelf near the double doors to the Commons. A wire basket is above this shelf.
7. Place the book card in front of the right portion of the box.
8. To return the book, place it in the wire basket above the wooden box. Library committee members will replace the card and re-shelve the book.

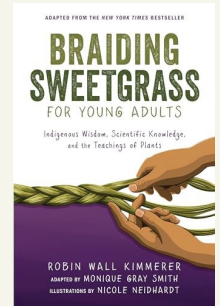

My life in art was transformed in 1973 when I enrolled in a design class at Mt. Mary College in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The teacher was a well-known artist and nun, Sister Mary Remy. She was recognized for her creative designs and joyful teaching. She taught design using silk screen printing on fabric as the medium.

We were taught in order to create designs, observation was the key, that everything in sight had the possibility to become a creative image, so our sketches evolved into remarkable designs. Organizing the designs on fabric created endless options. I was enthralled with the process and the seemingly limitless opportunities to experiment.

This fascination led me to explore printed, quilted, woven, and tapestry mediums bringing much joy to my life. My designs are sourced from the mountains, waterways, woods, and creatures I encounter while wandering, paddling, or digging in my own garden.

This exhibit brings together many of the creative approaches that I have explored over my years as an artist.
