December I: "We Need One Another." — cristy cardinal

In these times, which continue to be unprecedented and unpredictable, our interdependence is becoming imperative. It bears repeating at every turn: we need one another.

cristy cardinal (they/them) is a Unitarian Universalist minister recently welcomed into preliminary fellowship. They currently serve as a chaplain resident at Bon Secours Mercy Health's St. Vincent Hospital in Toledo, Ohio. They are a 2023 graduate of Starr King School for the Ministry, and their faith is liberatory with love at the center.

December 8: "The Right to Change One's Mind" — Rev. Rachel Lonberg

Francis David was a spiritual seeker, the founder of the Unitarian Church of Transylvania, and the person who converted the only Unitarian King in history. He died in prison in 1579, after being sentenced to life in prison for changing his mind with regards to religion. This Sunday we will tell Francis David's story and celebrate the right to change one's mind, our commitment to the idea that our

ideas about religion can—and should—transform as we gain wisdom, knowledge, and experience.

December 15: "Hope as Science Fiction" — Rev. Rachel Lonberg

'Hope is a sort of time travel,' a friend recently told Rev. Rachel. 'It is a practice of imagining a better future and letting that vision inspire you to act.' In this service, Rev. Rachel will reflect the lessons that science fiction and speculative fiction can teach us about hope in this challenging season.

December 22: "Winter Solstice Extravaganza All Ages Service" — Diane Melvin and People's Church Youth



Mark the solstice, the shortest day of the year, with an all-ages service led by the youth of our congregation. Everyone is invited to dress in their coziest clothes for this service exploring dormancy, rest, and hibernation.

Tuesday December 24, 5pm: "Christmas Eve Service" — Rev. Rachel Lonberg

Join us to retell the story of the Nativity and the Christmas Truce of World War I as we hope for the rebirth of love and peace in the present day. This service will feature music, poetry, storytelling and candlelight.





December 29: "Burning the Old Year: An All Ages Service" — Rev. Rachel Lonberg

In this service, we will mark the end of 2024 with rituals to let go of what we do not want to take with us into the coming year (by dramatically burning it up using magicians' flash paper!) and to set our intentions for the year ahead.



Dear People's people,

A few weeks ago, on the Sunday after the election, I shared wisdom for navigating this moment. It is worth repeating:

Take exquisite care of yourself. Drink more wa-

ter. Grief and worry are dehydrating. Take a nap. gentle stretches or running yourself to exhaustion or lifting heavy things or dancing by yourself to favorite music turned up loud. Turn to art that is meaningful to you or makes you feel good - we need moments of beauty, wonder, and joy right now. Eat French fries or your personal French fry equivalent, a food that makes you feel good. Wear your coziest clothes or the clothes or jewelry that will make you smile every time you see yourself in

Do what seems right. Remember what has helped you before. Do that again or try something new. Maybe caring for yourself and your most immediate circle is all you can do right now. That's how it is sometimes. Sometimes just getting to the next day is all we can manage. Do that. There will come a time when you can do more.

If you have more capacity right now, I have further instructions.

Hold fast to our values and our vision. 'But today, the invitation is clear: / to be ridiculously courageous in love. We live lives with love at the center. Our faith calls us to protect Earth and all beings from exploitation. Our faith calls us to recognize the inherent worth and dignity of all people. Our faith calls us to work for a vision of the Beloved Community, where all can flourish. Our faith calls us to live out the words on our banners. This will be what we hold true regardless of who the president is.

Next, we hold fast to each other. This is not a time to go it alone. With the storms coming, we need to be like the oaks of New Orleans whose

roots were so intertwined they survived through a hurricane. This is the slow work of relationships. We reach out to those in our circles, our neighbors and friends or families of chance and choice. We strengthen our connections. We build relationships at the speed of trust. We don't know what will be needed, but we know that the more people we are in trusting relationship with, the safer we all are. We keep each other safe.

Know that our church as an institution and me as Get outside. Move your body, whether that's a few your minister are doing this work of relationship on a larger scale. Some of you are embedded in other networks making plans. If the church as an institution can be a useful partner, please reach out to me. The board and I have started conversations about how we live our values now.

> We don't know what's ahead. But we know we are called to live with love at the center in this moment. To hold fast to our values and to each other. To be exquisite in our care for ourselves.

Climate Action in a Time of Despair


Since the election, some of my college students are despairing about their futures. They know steep reductions in greenhouse gas emissions must take place by 2030 to avoid acceleration of the climate crisis. One said the election 'made me think a lot about the uncertain future. I've been especially trying to make my impact on this planet a positive one, but there are times (like yesterday) where it's hard to feel like there's meaning to what we strive for; one step forward, ten steps back.' Here is what I've been telling my students.

The Biden administration enacted policies to develop US industrial capacity for clean energy, increase adoption of agricultural practices that store CO2 in soil, and help communities become more climate resilient. Many of these investments will probably survive because they pro-

vide jobs in red states. And automakers are lobbying to preserve electric vehicle

mandates that help them compete in a global car market.

More importantly, despite negligible federal climate legislation from 1990 to 2020, the nation made strides in developing green energy and reducing energy demand. That progress came from states and cities that said 'we are still in' the Paris Climate Agreement. They changed building codes to increase energy efficiency, required utilities to add renewable energy, installed EV chargers, built bike lanes, trained young people as solar installers and wind turbine technicians, and



This local action is where I will focus my energy for the next four years. There are great opportunities to engage with Kalamazoo's Imagine 2035 planning process, development of the Kalamazoo County climate action plan, and the state's Healthy Climate Plan.

Finally, one of the most important things for those of us working for better environmental/ climate/justice conditions is to have a supportive community. That was true before the election and is even more necessary now. It's long-term work, steps forward and back politically while also dealing with annual data reports that are sometimes positive and often terrifying. Having a community helps sustain us so we don't burn out or melt down. These blessed companions share the burdens, laugh and cry with us, and tell us it's okay to take a break while someone else steps up for a while. Most important, they remind us that to live in accord with our values is to live a good and meaningful life, even if we do not achieve all that we strive for in the world around us.


Grief for the Holidays: An Inner Work of Age Gathering open to all


Study Group






"All the Real Indians Died Off": and 21 Other Myths about Native Americans, by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz and Dina Gilio-Whitaker—370 Du


Tracing how these ideas evolved, and drawing from history, the authors disrupt long-held and enduring myths such as:

- "Columbus Discovered America"
- "Thanksgiving Proves the Indians Welcomed Pilgrims"
- "Sports Mascots Honor Native Americans"
- "Indian Casinos Make Them All Rich"

Each chapter deftly shows how these myths are rooted in the fears and prejudice of European settlers and in the larger political agendas of a settler state aimed at acquiring Indigenous land.

When the Light of the World Was Subdued, Our Songs Came Through; a Norton Anthology of Native Nations Poetry, edited by Joy Harjo—811.008 Wh Opening with a blessing from Pulitzer Prize—winner N. Scott Momaday, the book contains powerful introductions from contributing editors who represent the five geographically organized sections. Each section begins with a poem from traditional oral literatures and closes with emerging poets.





We Are Grateful: Otsaliheliga, by Traci Sorell—RE 975 So The word otsaliheliga (oh-jah-LEE-hay-lee-gah) is used by members of the Cherokee Nation to express gratitude. Beginning in the fall with the new year and ending in summer, follow a full Cherokee year of celebrations and experiences.

Young Native Activist; Growing Up in Native American Rights Movements, by Aslan Tudor—RE 976.4Tu

This is I I year old Aslan's story. An activist is someone who tries to make changes or raise awareness about political or social issues. As Native Americans we fight for our rights as the first people of this land. Aslan has been protecting rights since he was just a youngster.

World Religions

Our children and youth are exploring World Religions this year in religious education. Our K-6th graders have just finished their unit on Hinduism and begun exploring Buddhism.

Donations Needed for The Friends' Free Store for Refugees

The Friends' Free Store for Refugees sponsored by our Interfaith Refugee Resettlement Team needs donations of clothing, personal care items, cleaning products, toys and fabric.

For almost three years now, volunteers from the Interfaith Refugee Resettlement Team, made up of members of People's Church, Temple B'Nai Israel, and The Congregation of Moses and community members have been overseeing distribution of clothing donations to the hundreds of refugees that have arrived in our community since the large influx of Afghan families came to Kalamazoo in Nov/Dec of 2021 and spring of 2022. Many arrive with very little clothing and no warm clothes and boots.

The huge undertaking of organizing the clothing donations that come into the Friends' Free Store, graciously housed by the Congregation of Moses, has required many volunteers and many, many volunteer hours! Colleen VanSlambrouck, of People's Church and Janet Nykaza of Temple B'Nai Israel have spearheaded this project and keep things organized and functioning well. There are several hard working and dedicated volunteers from the community. They have done an amazing job!

As more and more refugees arrive to Kalamazoo from many unstable and unsafe countries around the world, the free store is always busy! Visits to "shop" are made by appointment as the space is somewhat small and too many "shoppers" can make Thank you for continuing to show support for

it too crowded. The donated items help the refugees stretch their limited resettlement funds.

Below is a list of items needed:

- Men's coats, boots, belts
- •Women's coats, boots
- •Teen girls' and boys' coats, boots
- Children's warm clothing & outerwear
- •Gloves/hats any
- •Blankets & towels



- •Fabric
- •Umbrellas
- Laundry baskets
- •Personal care items, such as shampoo, tooth paste, bar soap, lotion, feminine hygiene products (pads only), deodorant, etc. and fragrance-free laundry soap.

Donations of clothing, blankets and towels need to be dropped off at the Congregation of Moses. Drop -off time needs to be arranged with Colleen 269-341-0573 or with Janet Nykaza 269-861-1531. 
