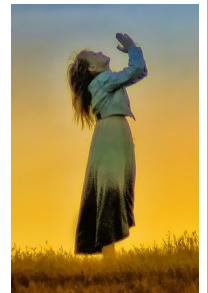
### October 12: "A Metaphor that Moves Me" - Ed Smith



It has been a special opportunity for me to participate in Pastor Rachel's sermon writing group. I chose to focus on a metaphor that came to me in the form of a song. The metaphor has helped me clarify the basis for the strong faith I have had since my youth. I will share the metaphor, and my song, and something of the spiritual journey that has led me to this new point of clarity. Note: this service was rescheduled from May.

### October 19: "The Gods I Don't Believe in" - Rev. Rachel Lonberg

The story goes that when physicist Albert Einstein was asked if he believed in God, he responded, 'First, tell me if you believe in God, then I'll tell you if I believe in him.' This Sunday, Rev. Rachel will echo this approach, exploring ideas of God that aren't in alignment with Unitarian Universalist theologies, in hopes of following this *via negativa* to come to some understanding about what (some of us) can believe about God.



### October 26: "Dracula, Epistemology, and the Search for Truth" - Rev. Rachel Lonberg



On the Sunday before Halloween, we continue our occasional series on the meaning of monsters. In Bram Stoker's *Dracula*, a small team is trying to make sense of mysterious deaths. A vampire doesn't initially seem like a reasonable explanation to our heroes, as they are steeped in science. Can they trust their experience over their received wisdom enough to take action before someone else dies? What might this story teach us all about how to know what is true?

Dear People's people,  
It is good to have seen so many of you in the last few weeks. While I love the intimacy of the summer Sunday services, there is such joy in a mostly full commons and a lot of Zoom connections on Sunday mornings.

Your lead staff and I are starting something new this month – **Second Saturdays Potluck and Programs at Church.** (This needs a catchier name. If you can think of something, please let me know.) We are hoping to cluster programs around a potluck lunch on the second Sunday of the month. There will be a morning program or two, a potluck lunch, and an afternoon program or two. Most of these won't be brand new programs, but events and activities that likely would have happened anyway, just clustered together.

This is an experiment. Why are we trying this? There are several overlapping reasons. Right after church services on Sundays is prime time for church programming – and too often we have competing programming then. We hope that second Saturdays might alleviate some of that pressure. For similar reasons, I think Saturday programs might work better for me as your minister. I am a better minister when I can linger over coffee with folks who attended the service in-person, making connections, checking in and answering quick questions, rather than rushing off to lead programming. Often, I am spent after I lead a Sunday service, as anyone who's watched me lose my way mid-sentence on a Sunday afternoon has experienced. Additionally, I am excited by the possibilities for connection that clustering programming on one day can offer. Over lunch, the folks who spent the morning making pasties, those who are attending a class, and those who are just stopping in for the meal can get to know each other. It's easy for us to get siloed from each other, clustered into smaller groups based on our interests and stages of life. It is my hope sharing a Saturday meal

together might help us build connections with one another.

Our first second Saturday program will happen on **October 11.**

- **Morning programming: pasty-making, building and grounds workday**
- **Potluck lunch at noon in Room 19 – bring something to share**
- **Afternoon programming: pasty-wrapping and a UU and People's Church history class led by Rev. Rachel**

(More details on these offerings are elsewhere in this newsletter.)

Feel free to come for as much or as little of this as you like. Yes, it is fine to come only for the meal!

We are going to have second Saturday programs and a potluck for several months. In the spring, we will assess how it has gone so far and make a decision about if and how we continue. In the meantime, if you want to offer a program or activity at the church, please consider scheduling it for a second Saturday.

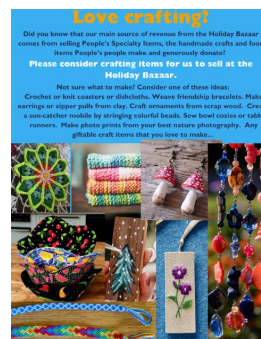

### Only 1 more Rain Garden Therapy session!

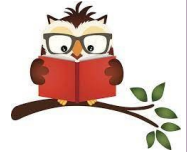
Our rain garden is in its second season. Native gardens take 3 years to establish. So what does that mean? We will tend the garden more closely this and next year. Years following, the maintenance time will be much less.

Join in for some very informal education about native-to-Michigan plants as we work on the rain garden. Over this season we’ll pull weeds, observe plant growth, learn about the Chel-sea Chop. We will regularly take deep cleansing breaths and work on creating a border around the garden so our mowers have an easier time of it.

The Rain Garden work time takes place on the 3rd Saturday of every month, with the last session of the season will be October 18th. Whether you can volunteer as a one-time or ongoing effort, this hands-on Green Sanctuary committee project is a fun way to be with People’s People! ## **Evening Book Club—Newcomers Welcome!**



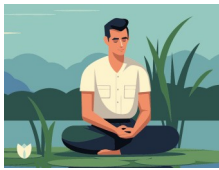

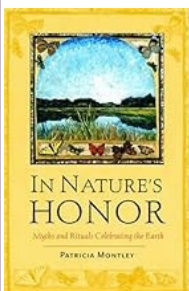
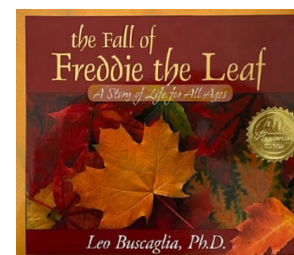
### Here Comes the Sun; a Last Chance for the Climate and a Fresh Chance for Civilization,

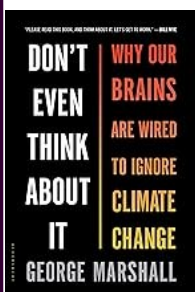
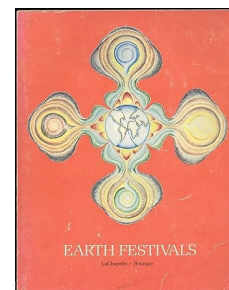
### In Nature's Honor; Myths and Rituals Celebrating the Earth, by Patricia Montley — 203.8 Mo

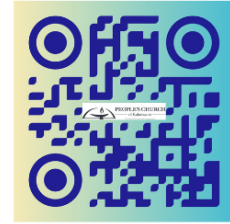

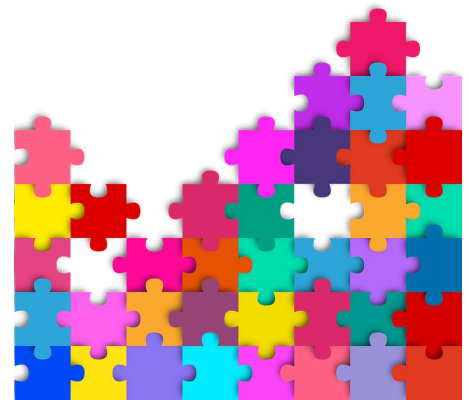

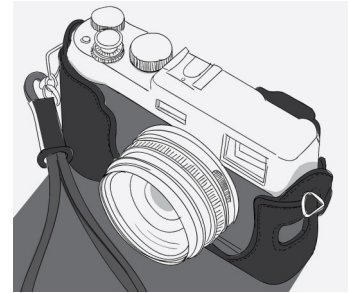
- Review ALL of the great ideas posted
