

Dear People's people,

It is easy to get discouraged right now.

Overwhelm and fear are closer companions to me right now than they have been in a while. When it gets

hard, I try to remind myself of the small, courageous things that so many people are doing to try to hold fast to our values in this moment.

I think about the bags and boxes of food for hungry neighbors that have appeared at the church in recent weeks, crowding our entryway as they wait for the next time Rick's truck swings by. I see the toiletries and winter gear that not-so-magically appear in another part of the church building, the collection point for the refugee friends free store at Congregation of Moses. We are meeting the basic needs of our community in powerful ways.

I think of the folks in our community who have asked for help – financial support from the minister's discretionary fund, emotional support, spiritual support, tangible help like meals. It is brave and important to trust one's community enough to ask for care and support. And we, at least most of the time, are meeting folks' needs.

I think of how People's Church – and so many People's people – have acted with courage and integrity and love over the past year. The donors to our refugee support fund and dedicated volunteers made it so newly arrived refugee families were not abandoned when promised federal support and programs were cut last year. Your giving to the resistance and resilience fund has made such a tremendous difference in the lives of people in our community, mostly undocumented folks, asylees, and transgender folks. Their stories are not mine to tell, but know that your giving has kept people safe and housed and cared for when they had nowhere else to turn. Our building space is being so many outside groups who help us co-create the

world we want to live in. And there are the small actions that I see so many of you taking – speaking out for inclusion (including a recent time that a People's Church kid taught me to be more inclusive), interrupting cruelty in family and communities and workplaces, building community and resilience across difference, being generous. I am always grateful when I get to hear your stories about living in alignment with our values.

Knowing that I am not alone in this moment helps. That there are hundred of folks in our church trying to be 'People of Hope' right now helps – and knowing there are millions more beyond our congregation who are also working to build the Beloved Community helps too. We are not alone in our commitments. We are not alone in trying to meet this moment.

- •Engaging more people than ever from our congregation - elders, youth, long-timers, newcomers, members and friends. You helped in all the ways needed: making more than 600 pasties; publicizing and promoting the event in so many ways; preparing a wide variety and a huge volume of your handmade goods and tasty treats to laden our specialty tables, which constitute our earnings from this event; and volunteering for all the roles needed in the work of putting on the event – from Monday madness and set-up, to staffing all the specialty tables, pasty sales, raffle sales, cashiering, greeting, shuttle driving, emergency personnel presence, kitchen workers, cooks and runners, to the last task of the miraculous clean-up; and supporting the event with your purchases.
- •Building community within the church through our work together and expanding our outreach to the wider community by opening our doors wide.
- •Supporting the work of 32 tremendously creative artists from our local community, who always list our people, the warm and friendly tone of this event, and the great food as reasons this is one of their favorite shows.
- •And now, for the bottom line, (drum roll...) making nearly \$20,000! This will be adjusted for ex-

penses, expected to be around \$2,500. Through our work together, netting over \$17,500 to support our church and our mission. This is a solid result that comes in well over the church budget's expectations. Outstanding work, all!

It is a big project that is done with love for this community. These are classes for newcomers and anyone else who wants to know more about People's Church.


- Saturday December 13, 1-3pm: How People's Church Works – go deeper into how the church works – religious education, Sunday services, governance, and a building tour

Rain Garden Update, 2025 Season

Under the direction of the Green Sanctuary Committee, we added a rain garden to People's property in September of 2023. We filled the garden with native plants and grasses, as these plants:

- develop deep root structures to filter contaminants from the pavement
- absorb water during heavy rain events
- feed pollinators and provide habitat for wildlife
- provide beauty and educational opportunities for humans
- show an example of stormwater management as the climate changes
- improve our soil by break up the dense clay that is present-it's at least 5 feet deep, which is why we have a pond most of the time.

This project also supports our UU values of Interdependence ("we honor the interdependent web of all existence and acknowledge our place in it") and Transformation ("we adapt to the changing world").






Native plant gardens generally take three years to fully develop their root systems and flower production. We just completed the second year, with volunteers meeting monthly during the growing season to maintain and improve the garden, which was a fun time. We also moved a little used bench from the Memorial Garden to the area.

In the early spring we had a couple unfortunate incidents of cars, looking for a parking place, backing into the garden (!!). So, we figured out a way to move the large boulders already at the site to provide a barrier between driveway and garden. (The) Green Sanctuary purchased solar lights to highlight the area after dark.

We created a walking path which also makes mowing easier. That project continues.

We discovered that two of the white pines closest to the driveway have a fatal disease, and plan to remove them next spring so they won't contaminate the other pines.

Beginning in late April 2026, volunteers will continue to meet, now on the second Saturday of each month (weather permitting). By moving the group to the










We will expand the garden to include plants in the area where the boulders used to be, using enthusiastic plants we will thin from the existing garden.


In Later Years: Finding Meaning and Spirit in Aging by Bruce T. Marshall

The beginning of winter is marked by the solstice, the shortest day of the year. Long ago, people grew afraid when each day had fewer hours of sunshine than the day before. Over time, they realized that one day each year the sun started moving toward them again. This book explains what the winter solstice is and how it has been observed by various cultures throughout history. Many contemporary holiday traditions were borrowed from ancient solstice celebrations.

Update from the Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees met in November to review current projects and upcoming events at People's Church. The Board believes it is important to regularly assess the church and its work as a whole to ensure that we are effectively and collectively moving toward our mission, vision and values, and has commissioned the formation of a committee to assess these things on multi-year cycles. The Board also reviewed our process for making social justice position statements to be more responsive to social movements as we continue to explore our church's role in social justice.
