### February 1: “On Being a Grief Literate Community” — Rev. Jill Terwilliger

Loss and grief touch our lives in myriad ways, yet many of us feel unsure how to respond when they show up in our communities. This sermon reflects on what it means to be a grief-literate community and invites us to grow our capacity to accompany one another through loss with honesty, humility, and love.



Rev. Jill Terwilliger is a grief and change coach at Anbau Coaching and a hospice grief support counselor. She is a TEDx speaker whose work draws on experience in parish ministry, mental health advocacy, hospice chaplaincy, restorative justice, and the arts. Her work is grounded in the understanding that grief arises not only from death, but from all the transitions that reshape our lives. Born and raised Unitarian Universalist, Jill was ordained to the ministry in 2000. She has lived along the I-94 corridor her whole life, from Milwaukee to Madison to Minneapolis, and, for the last 23 years, Kalamazoo.

### February 8: “Living the Questions” — Rev. Rachel Lonberg

As we prepare for an upcoming capital campaign to pay for maintenance and improvement of our current church home (see other parts of the newsletter for more details on that), this Sunday, we will look back at the various homes this church has had over the years, from the Fireman's Hall in 1855 to two downtown locations to our home of the last 55 years on 10th Street.



### February 22: “Our Whole Lives” — Rev. Rachel Lonberg and People's Church Youth

 One of the most important ministries of People's Church is providing the Our Whole Lives Comprehensive Sexuality Education program for our children and youth. In this service, Rev. Rachel and People's Church youth who have participated in the Our Whole Lives program will reflect on the importance of comprehensive sexuality education rooted in the values of self-worth, sexual health, responsibility, inclusivity, and justice.



Dear People's People,

In addition to the overview of church history, Unitarian Universalist theology, and church programs and logistics that we include in the inquirers class, there are a few things I try to repeat to every cohort of the class, every group of folks learning about if this community is right for them. I figured this wisdom doesn't need to be just for newcomers, so I'm sharing it as a reminder:

**If you want to be known in the church and know others, join a small group.** It is difficult to build meaningful connections with others if your participation in church life is limited to Sunday mornings. Relationship building happens in small groups – any small group. Possible small groups include chalice circles, book clubs, bell choir or voice choir, the Tuesday morning building and grounds work group, the finance committee (or any of our fine committees) and more. If you are looking to know others at church, find a small group. If you need help figuring out which group might be right for you, reach out to me. I'll help you navigate the possibilities.

**If you see the church not being who we say we want to be, please tell me (or another church leader).** Are we talking about justice and equity and love but failing to live it. Please be brave and tell us. I always tell this to newcomers because they are often the best at spotting the gap between our aspirations and our reality, but anyone can notice this. Those of us who have been here for a while can't always recognize this as well as newcomers, so I ask newcomers to be brave and tell us the moments where we are not living into our values.

**Know that the church will disappoint you. When that happens, try to stay.** Sometimes, newcomers arrive in our community and think we're really great. We are really great and we are also human. There will be times when the church as an institution or individuals within it will disappoint you. This is inevitable, unfortunately. When

the disappointment happens, stay and try to stick it out. I'm not asking anyone to overlook abuse or egregious misconduct – I'm referencing the conflicts and disappointments that are always part of humans trying to be in community together. In staying through the small disappointments, richness and depth and strong relationships can happen. I often make the analogy to a romantic relationship. It often takes the first argument to figure out how compatible people are. That's not always true, but it's a useful analogy in this instance.


What are things you would tell someone exploring if this congregation is right for them? Let me know and I might share your wisdom with the next Inquirers Class.






## Dismantling White Supremacy from Within








## In Later Years: Finding Meaning and Spirit in Aging by Bruce T. Marshall

## Library Corner

The following review was written by church member Cory Zann.

**Cheng-Tozun, D. 2023. *Social Justice for the Sensitive Soul: How to Change the World in Quiet Ways.* — 303.372 Ch**

Cheng-Tozun defines a “Sensitive Soul” as someone who identifies with one of “three overlapping groups: highly sensitive, empathetic, and introverted. This book is for those who identify with one of these groups and interested “in engaging with social justice” ... in a way that allows us to “live authentically and joyfully”. (5).

Cheng-Tozun identifies as a sensitive soul who has been committed to social justice work for many years. As a result of not taking care of herself, she has suffered several serious emotional and physical burnouts” that forced her to step back from work for extended periods of time in order to recover. The result of these experiences is her keen awareness of the importance of personal care while doing this work.

The author discusses many strategies for preventative self-care and included many examples of where to find such work. Having also worked with more extroverted social justice groups, Cheng-Tozun discusses the different dynamics of such groups, how they can support each other while doing their work and challenges they face.

For perspective, Cheng-Tozun discusses the lives of several well-known activists like Desmond Tutu, Nelson Mandela, Ghandi, Thoreau, and others. Her message: “We are all more effective advocates of change when we balance one another.” (59)

The author pairs each chapter with related quotations by social justice activists from different centuries. The book has an extensive Appendix and Notes citing sources.

### How to Search the People's Church Library Catalog from Home

The instructions below are listed in People's Church website ([peopleschurch.net](http://peopleschurch.net)). Find ‘Learning’ in the blue strip above the large photos. Choose Church Library Catalog from the drop down menu.



1. Go to [www.librarything.com/catalog/peopleschurchofkzoo](http://www.librarything.com/catalog/peopleschurchofkzoo)
2. Decide which collection you'd like to search (Examples: Main Church Library=adult titles; RE Library=children's titles) and select it from the list in the upper left.
3. Near the upper right in the box next to the yellow word ‘Search’, enter a title or author or simple desired topic.
4. Use the book's Dewey call number in the left hand column to locate the book in People's library. People's Library collection is located in the upper foyer to the left of the door into the Commons. The books are divided into Main Church Library (adult) and RE Library (children's).
5. The Main Church Library begins to the left of the middle of the back wall and continues (left to right, in ascending Dewey call numbers) across the aisle to the right end of the low bookshelves and then around to the front of the bookcase, ending with B (biographies). The RE Library begins in the middle of the front side of the low bookshelves, ending with RE picture books and fiction (J).





**Update from the Board of Trustees**


At our January 2026 meeting, we celebrated the purchase of our solar panels and the generosity of people's donations to the cause; this decreased the amount we needed to draw from the Palmer fund for the purchase. After discussion, it was agreed that having an Affiliated Community Minister would be beneficial for all; (presently there is a community minister in the Kalamazoo area). The two ministers will create a contract on how to communicate and work together and will submit for Board approval. In looking towards sustainability for our future, it was decided that we would hold a unified capital and operating stewardship campaign in the spring. To continue striving to be our best, the Board plans to form an Ad Hoc Committee with a diverse group of people that come to church. The goal is to look at our assessment of how our programs and services are ministering to the people, to then help form a strategic plan with action steps to achieve our overarching goals. People's Church is a wonderful, welcoming, supportive community; be alert to the enhanced variety of ways the church will be sharing about the inter-workings of church life.
