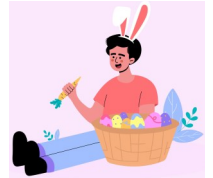

April 5: "To Be Continued: An Easter Service" — Rev. Rachel Lonberg

On Easter, we celebrate that stories don't always end when we think they do. Sometimes, the tomb is empty. Sometimes, resurrections happen. In this service we will explore how we might practice resurrection and we will celebrate the unlikely



resurrections as we tell and re-tell stories of Jesus, spring, and a woman named Gussie who always dressed up for church. This Sunday's sermon is a re-working of a sermon originally preached at People's Church in March 2016.

This Sunday will include a shelter-in-place drill for all in-person attendees.

April 12: "We Are Good Neighbors" — Rev. Rachel Lonberg



At a recent gathering of interfaith clergy in Kalamazoo, an idea emerged. What if the message that can inspire the work of love and justice in this moment is as simple as 'We are good neighbors?' This simple commitment to care for those nearby is a vital way to live our values in this moment.

In honor of Mr. Rogers, who taught many to be good neighbors, everyone is encouraged to wear a cardigan sweater to the service today.

April 19: "Seeds of Hope: An Earth Day All Ages Service" — Rev. Rachel Lonberg & Diane Melvin, Director of Religious Education

It is a hard moment to feel hopeful. This service will include small stories about ways people are caring for the planet in Southwest Michigan as well as group art projects that might just bring us hope 'when hope is hard to find.'



April 26: "Abortion Bans are Against My Religion: What Judaism has to Teach About Reproductive Justice" — Rabbi Simone Schicker

Rabbi Simone Schicker (she/her) has been the spiritual leader of Temple B'nai Israel in Kalamazoo since her ordination from Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion in 2018. Rabbi Schicker currently serves as the co-President of the Women's Rabbinic Network, is on the Board of Friendship Village Kalamazoo and is a member of Faith Alliance: a program of OutFront Kalamazoo. Originally from Houston, Rabbi

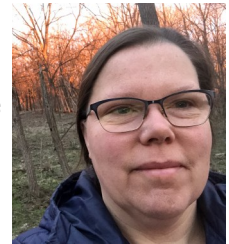

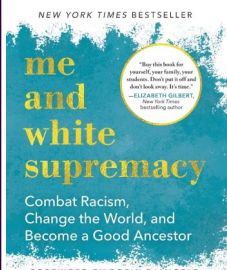

GET THE CARBON OUT!

People's Church 20 year Net Zero Plan

While you are all deciding about your pledges for our combined campaign, this is a good time to learn about the Zero Carbon elements in our 20 year building fund program.

While the building projects are inspired by the need to make our building last for many generations, they also provide a real opportunity to move us away from fossil fuels and greenhouse gases.



Currently our biggest carbon hogs are a gas fired boiler which heats the 56 year old core building, one gas powered water heater, gas ranges in the kitchen, and gas roof furnaces on the 15 year old addition. We also have an aging riding mower which burns petrol. The plan envisions shifting all these devices to electric as they wear out. (mini-split heat pumps in the older part of the building, full size heat pumps for the addition, induction stoves in the kitchen, a heat pump water heater for the kitchen, and an electric mower for Building and Grounds use).

Of course the electricity we purchase from Consumers Energy is largely produced by burning coal, gas and oil (about 72% fossil fuel generated in 2023), so reducing our total energy use, both gas and electric, is important as well. We have already reduced our electric usage by 40% with the addition of the solar array and some other efficiency measures, and we plan to continue strategically insulating and sealing the biggest heat loss areas such as the walls and ceilings in the core building, and by repairing and replacing the windows and doors. The roof over the commons is going to need replacing in the next 5-10 years, and at that time we will put a layer of insulation down before a new roof goes on.



At the present time adding battery storage would not be an advantage because we can send our excess solar generated electricity back to the grid for a very good rate. However, if the church decides to add more solar in the future, battery storage will begin to make sense for us, and will help provide a climate resilient refuge.

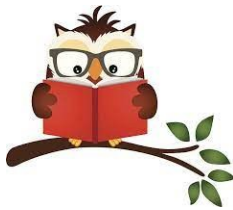

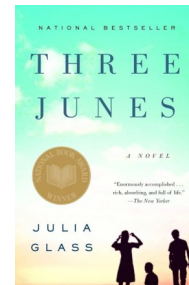

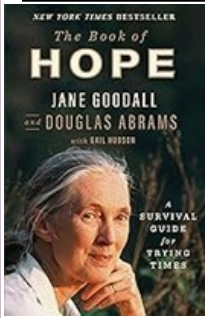


Yarn Lover's Unite

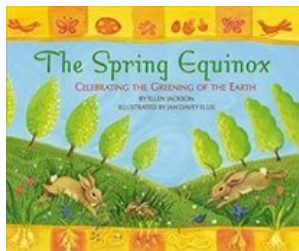
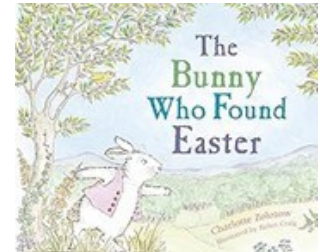


The Book of Hope: a Survival Guide for Trying Times, by Jane Goodall and Douglas Abrams — 304.2 Go

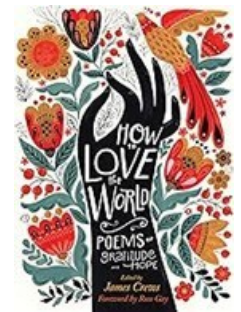


The Spring Equinox; Celebrating the Greening of the Earth, by Ellen Jackson — RE 394.26 Ja
