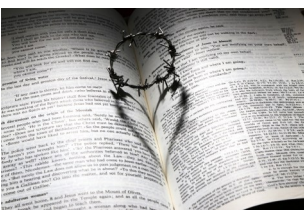
September 20: "All of Who You Are is Welcome Here: An Intergenerational Service" — Diane Melvin and Rev. Rachel Lonberg

At People's Church, we work hard to practice hospitality, generosity, and inclusion to all sorts of people – and this is always a work in progress. In this service for all ages, we will explore how we are already living out these values – and recommit to even broader visions of welcome, in this time when so many are in need of community.



September 27: "Verses and Curses: What Should We Do with the Bible?" — Rev. Rachel Lonberg

This Sunday, we will begin our religious education program for children and youth. Many of our children will be learning stories and teachings from the Bible this



church year. This inspires Rev. Rachel to reflect on Unitarian Universalist approaches to the Bible. What do we do with the Bible, especially now in this time of rising Christian nationalism? (If liberal and liberatory approaches to the Bible interest you, please check out the multi-congregation Bible study happening this fall!)



Dear People's people,

This summer, I have been noticing the power of teamwork and collaboration both within and beyond our congregation.

Within our congregation, I have noticed how **so many in the church have done such powerful ministry this summer** – both in public ways (please watch some of the summer services newly uploaded on our YouTube page, if you weren't able to attend them!) and in more private ways – the steady flow of meals and cards to people who need care always inspires me. People's people, led by our building and grounds team, purchased a necessary new lawnmower. Summer religious education and two sessions of Peace and Nature Camp have kept our children having fun while building community and deepening their understanding of our values. And it took many of us to attempt to fill in for Eli as he was on medical leave this summer.

As I prepare for fall, the collaboration continues. I am excited about a few offerings and opportunities that will happen over the next few months.

September 9 is the first session of a **multi-congregation joint Bible Study called 'Bible Problems'**. 'This grew out of conversations I had with local clergy – the Good Neighbors Collaborative, we're calling ourselves – and with some of you who had questions about the Bible. Please come to learn from people more knowledgeable about the Bible than I am about issues including women preachers and Christian nationalism. This group is all clergy from mainline to progressive traditions. We will largely agree – and it will be good to hear various perspectives and get to know some of the other people of faith in our community who share our values, if not our perspective on the Bible.

There are a few more opportunities to learn with others that are coming soon:

A UU History 101 online class offered by our partners at First Unitarian, Dallas. Learn UU history with UUs from all over the country. Details are listed elsewhere in this newsletter.

A Zoom book club for the **UUA's Common**

Read Love at the Center. This is a collection of theological essays. If this interests you, I encourage you to pick up a copy and pay attention to the church newsletter. We'll be having a Zoom book club with at least one other congregation, starting later this fall.

We also partner with other community organizations to do good and important work in the wider community. One of these collaborations is giving away one offering plate per month to a community organization. **I would love to hear what organizations you think would be good recipients of our special offering.** If you know of a local organization making our values real in the world, please send me a note. We generally focus our special offering on organizations that are either local or specifically Unitarian Universalist, are aligned with our values, and are small enough that our special offering (typically \$800-\$1000) can make an impact. Please email, call, or text me with your nominations. I imagine I'll receive more nominations than spots available, but I'm curious to learn what organizations you support.

New Artist Spotlight - Jason Reicherts - WaterWood Studio

Jason Reicherts has longed to create art for as long as he can remember and his passion has only grown stronger over time. From a young age, he was drawn to artistic endeavors, receiving an art set from an Aunt and Uncle that hinted at a future path.

Fueled with inspiration and determination, Jason took 2 painting classes in college, acrylic and watercolor painting. There was no denying that Jason took to the watercolor paint with ease and confidence.

This would be the medium he would try and perfect. Despite his limited experience, he was fascinated by the medium's capacity for creating layers and its unpredictable blending. He appreciated the immediacy and decisiveness required in watercolor painting, knowing that once the paint was on the paper, it was like a period at the end of a sentence.



Now, with a renewed sense of urgency and the time to dedicate to his craft, Jason is determined to release all of the ideas that have been swirling around in his head all these years. He has built a new studio at his home on Pickerel Lake in Scotts, MI called WaterWood Studio where Jason continues to draw and paint, but also works with wood. The wooden frames he makes for his original pieces are meant to accentuate the art, but not overshadow it. This originality and uniqueness to each piece is a testament to Jason's lifelong journey with art.

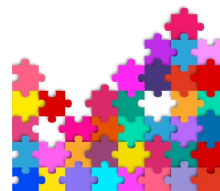
Yarn Lover's Unite

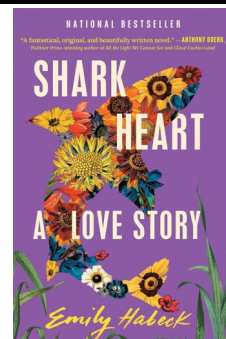

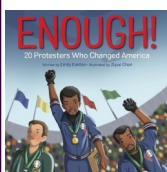
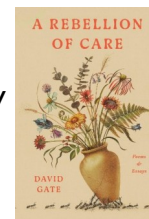


“They Called Me a Lioness; a Palestinian Girl’s Fight for Freedom”, by Ahed Tamimi and Dena Takruri — 956.94 Ta

A Palestinian activist jailed at sixteen after a confrontation with Israeli soldiers illuminates the daily struggles of life under occupation in this moving, deeply personal memoir.

“A Rebellion of Care; Poems & Essays”, by David Gate — 818 Ga

A moving manifesto in poems and essays, inviting readers to embrace their humanity and live fully alive in our age of social change, hyper-capitalism, and pervasive loneliness.

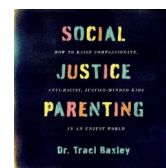


“Enough; Protesters Who Changed America”, by Emily Easton — RE 303.484 Ea

Change takes courage. Introduce young activists to America's most influential protesters in this lushly illustrated picture book. Stand beside contemporary groundbreakers like Colin Kaepernick and transgender teen Jazz Jennings, and march in the footsteps of historical revolutionaries such as Harriet Tubman and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. This moving text opens with a foreword from a Parkland shooting survivor.

“Social Justice Parenting; How to Raise Compassionate, Anti-Racist, Justice-Minded Kids in an Unjust World”, by Dr. Traci Baxley — 649.1 Ba

As a global pandemic shuttered schools across the country in 2020, parents found themselves thrust into the role of teacher—in more ways than one. Not only did they take on remote school supervision, but after the murder of George Floyd and the ensuing Black Lives Matter protests, many also grappled with the responsibility to teach their kids about social justice—with few resources to guide them.

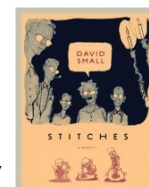


“The Many Colors of Harpreet Singh”, by Supriya Kelkar — J Ke

Harpreet loves his colors—but when his family moves to a new city, everything just feels gray. Can he find a way to make life bright again? Harpreet has a different color for every mood and occasion, from pink for dancing to bhangra beats to red for courage. He especially takes care with his patka—his turban—smoothing it out and making sure it always matches his outfit. But when Harpreet’s mom finds a new job in a snowy city and they have to move, all he wants is to be invisible. Will he ever feel a happy sunny yellow again?

“Stitches, a Memoir”, by David Small — 921 Sm

David Small, a best-selling and highly regarded children's book illustrator, comes forward with this unflinching graphic memoir. Remarkable and intensely dramatic, Stitches tells the story of a fourteen-year-old boy who awakes one day from a supposedly harmless operation to discover that he has been transformed into a virtual mute—a vocal cord removed, his throat slashed and stitched together like a bloody boot. From horror to hope, Small proceeds to graphically portray an almost unbelievable descent into adolescent hell and the difficult road to physical, emotional, and artistic recovery.

Fall Kick Off Plans

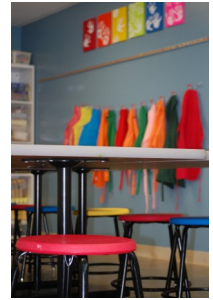
